Zinc in Industry Starting with the nineteenth century the increase in the use of zinc was decidedly accelerated. During the first decade the production was estimated at 6,000 tons. In the fifth decade the output had jumped to 367,000 tons, and for the half century the total was 635,000 tons. The output of the second half century reached the amazing total of 12,100,000 tons, or an increase of 1,800 per cent. The acceleration has continued, and in the year 1927 the output was 1,444,000 tons, a total equal to the production of the first 60 years of the nineteenth century.

Nearly one-third of the entire world's output of zinc has been produced in the United States.
