### Armistice Day Program Big Event at The Dalles

Plans for the Armistice Day celebration at The Dalles, November 11, are nearing completion. The celebration will be staged under the direction of the American Legion and promises to consist of one of the most complete programs of festivity held there for many years.

The slogan adopted by the Legion for the affair is "Celebrate Armistice Day at The Dalles," and from all indications that is precisely what most of the residents in this and neighboring counties plan to do.

The day will begin with a parade which will form at 10 o'clock and start promptly at 10:30 rain or shine. The route followed will be east from the Auditorium on fourth street to Jefferson, north on Jefferson to Third, east on Third to Madison, north on Madison to Second, west on Second to Liberty, south on Liberty to Third where it will disband.

Two loving cups will be presented winning entries in the parade. The first will be given to the fraternal organization making the best showing. The second will be awarded to the store or organization entering the best float in the parade, having, as a background, a Military or Armistice Day thought.

The store or business house having the most appropriately decorated window will be presented with a loving cup.

Three business men will act as judges, and it will undoubtedly be difficult for them to come to a decision, as the competition is expected to be exceptionally keen. Co. H., O. N. G. always puts up an excellent showing, as does the Artisan drill team. The high school girls drum corps and the high school boys band are always good. The Firemen will be attired in their snappiest uniforms, and it is rumored, the Crag Rats of Hood River and the Hood River post of the American Legion will do their best to "take" the prizes.

The early part of afternoon will be given over to the football game between the Hood River and The Dalles high schools. The game will begin at 1:30 o'clock, on Murray field. Hood River is reported to have as good a team as The Dalles this year, and fans are looking forward to witnessing a real scrap.

The Dalles post has challenged the Hood River post to a tug of war pull, to take place between halves of the football game, for a purse of \$25.00.

At 5:30 o'clock, the visiting and local veterans will attend a stag banquet in the gymnasium of the Civic Auditorium. Judge F. W. Wilson will be toastmaster, and other good speakers will be on the program.

While the veterans are dining the public must be entertained, so the Legion has arranged with Mathews and Moran at the Granada Theater, for the showing of "Salute," an all talking picture, based upon life in the Navy and around the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md. The doors of the theatre will open at 2 p. m., the picture will be shown continuously until 11 o'clock.

Vic Rads and The Dalles boxing commission will stage a fight in the auditorium, to begin at 7:30 o'clock sharp.

Dancing will begin at 9:30 o'clock in the auditorium ball room, and will continue until midnight. There will be good music.

### Oregon State News

There are 18,000 bales of hops in storage in three Salem warehouses, according to announcement made at Salem. These bales contain approximately 3,800,000 pounds of hops.

With the exception of two major projects, road work in Columbia county for 1929 is about over with practically all of the road funds expended, according to Roadmaster Barney.

The pheasant hunting season in Columbia county, which closed recently, was satisfactory to a majority of the hunters. The birds were plentiful in the lowlands along the river as well as in the uplands. The deer hunting season, however, was a disappointment.

James Wolfe, a fisherman about four miles up Alesia river from Waldport, reports that one night recently 14 tons, mostly silver salmon, were caught by himself and his immediate neighbors. The salmon run this year has so far been the best for a number of years.

The late potato crop in Columbia county will be at least 40 per cent short and possibly more, according to reports received by George A. Nelson, county agent. Dry weather of the summer and fall is responsible for the small yield, he stated.

Harvesting of Klamath county's potato crop is in full swing. Shipments are going out at the average rate of 20 cars per day in addition to truck shipments. About 300 cars have been shipped to date. All shipments are going to the California market.

While a large number of fire lookouts in Crater National forest have been dropped, the lookouts at the Dutchman peak and Tallowbox mountain stations and the emergency lookout at Robinson Butte will be kept on duty until general rains come.

The fill is completed in Palmer creek at the west city limits of Dayton on the Dayton-McMinnville highway. The Dayton bridge spanning the Yamhill river at west city limits, while not entirely completed, will be opened to traffic within a few days.

### Oregon State News

Probably the largest deer ever seen in Bandon was brought in by S. L. Shumate on his return from a hunting trip to Klamath county. It was a six-point deer and weighed 243 pounds.

The Bly Water company, supplying water to the residents of Bly, in Klamath county, has purchased two more wells from J. C. Edsall, with sufficient ground for a pumping plant, and rights of way for two additional mains.

After securing oil land leases on some 30,000 acres in the Marney valley, an oil company will drill its first well on the Culp ranch, 12 miles west of Crane. It is to be a test well, 12 of which will be drilled in the valley.

Hazards of night driving will be less during the coming winter months if Secretary of State Hoag is successful in his plans to eliminate the "one-eyed" automobile, or cars with only one headlight, from the Oregon highways.

Construction work on the third plant of the Western Lumber company was started on the outskirts of Klamath Falls recently, according to an announcement by Irving E. Kesterson, vice-president and general manager of the company.

President Hoover will be presented with the box of Wasco county apples that won the sweepstakes award at the Pacific International Livestock exposition, it was announced by I. F. Sandos of The Dalles, who grew and packed the fruit.

The Barbery Packing company, operating a plant at Rainier, has finished the season's pack on beans, having put up about 30,000 cases. A considerable portion of the beans came from the Scappoose delta lands and were of excellent quality.
