Suit Filed Against Court

Suit was filed in the Sherman
county circuit court on November 2
by an attorney from Hood River act-
ing for Lot W. Rust, Ruby B. Pettys,
and Ellis Hughes, plaintiffs, against
the members of the county court, E.
D. McKee, L. L. Peetz and A. A. Dun-
lap, the county treasurer, A. M.
Young, and the county superintend-
ent, L. W. Rakes, asking for return
to legislative salary requirements in-
sofar as the superintendent's office
was concerned and return of claimed
excess salary paid in recent years.
Since the suit was placed on record,
at the budget committee meeting this
week, an adjustment was made that
may continue Mr. Rakes in office;
and to make this more effective,
petitions have been drawn and are
being circulated over the county by
volunteer workers to bring the mat-
ter to a local county vote by initia-
tive petition.
