Moro Scout News

An award of the Eagle badge, the
highest rank in scouting, will be
made to Tommy Fraser, a boy scout
of Troop number 6 of Moro on Sun-
day, December 29th, at 11 a. m. in
the Presbyterian Church in Moro,
it was announced by Rev. Chas. D.
Parrott.This ceremony will include a Court
of Honor session participated in by
members of the local troop committee
with the assistance of Scout Executive
W. W. Belcher and members of the
District Council from The Dalles.It is announced that this will be an
interesting ceremony and is open to
the public. Friends and relatives of
all boys will be welcome as this will
afford an opportunity for first hand
contact with some of the boy scout
work.To obtain an Eagle badge a
scout must be a first class scout for
at least a year, earn at least twenty
one merit badges including First Aid,
Life Saving, Personal and Public
Health, Cooking, Camping, Civics,
Bird Study, Pathfinding, Pioneering,
Swimming, and Athletics or Physical
Development. In addition to these
requirements, he must furnish satisfac-
tory evidence to the Court of
Honor "that he has continued to put
into practice the ideals and principles
of the scout oath and law, the motto
"Be Prepared" and the "Daily Good
Turn"; that he has maintained an
active service relationship to scouting
for more than a year since he became
first class and that he has made an
effort to develop and demonstrate
leadership ability."In checking up on these character
points, letters are written to the
scout's parents, scoutmaster, em-
ployer, neighbor, Sunday-School teach-
er or minister, and school teacher
or principal, outlining the require-
ments, and asking their opinion and
recommendations of the scout. When
these answers are satisfactory, the
application for Eagle rank comes be-
fore the local council for approval,
and is then ready for the National
Court of Honor to consider and award
the badge.Since the American Legion is spon-
soring the boyscouts here it is ex-
pected that the scout committee appointed
by the Legion be present. All of the
members of the American Legion
of the post of Moro are urged to
attend as well as the members of the
Auxiliary.Merchants of Moro and Sherman
county generally, who are ordinarily
