Höme Pointers

(From School of Home Economics)

Fresh rhubarb in gelatin makes an excellent substitute for fruit in a salad.
Wood alcohol rubbed on windows with a sponge will keep them free from ice.

A little shredded coconut and a bit of almond flavoring give a delicious new flavor to rice pudding.

If candle holders are not procurable, the top of a cake may be decorated with marshmallows with a candle stuck in one.

Woolen materials can often be darned with threads of the material, split silk, or hair so that the garment may again be presentable.

Every wise homemaker plans to use an abundance of eggs in the spring, in the interests of good economy as well as good nutrition.

An oil mop may be cleaned by dipping in soap suds to which has been added a little household ammonia. Rinsing in warm water completes the process.

A corn popper is very convenient for roasting walnuts. If the whole nuts are put in and roasted until the shells are soft and crumbly, the meats are delicious.

Doughnuts are likely to crack during frying if the fat is too hot when they are first put in. This does not spoil them, necessarily, but they do absorb a little more fat.

The disagreeable odor often left in dishes or pans that have contained fish may be removed by adding a large tablespoonful of salt to the rinsing water when washing them.

A new way to cook potatoes! Scrub them thoroughly with a vegetable brush, boil in "jackets" until tender, cut in thick slices, brush with fat and brown under a broiler. The result is delicious.

Gas-stove burners may be cleaned by boiling them in a strong solution of washing soda and water for half an hour, then washing in warm water and drying thoroughly. This removes all the grease.

A pretty way to serve biscuits for a luncheon is to cut them in tiny rounds, (an empty paprika can may be used for this) and fit three in each compartment of a muffin pan. This gives a clover leaf effect.

Fresh greens, whether wild or cultivated, add variety to the diet and stimulate capricious appetites. They furnish building material for children, help prevent constipation and supply the vitamins needed for normal health.

A piece of old inner tube folded over the edge of the table or shelf to which the food chopper is to be attached or screwed, will prevent the clamps from marring the surface and will also keep the chopper from slipping.

Have you ever tried "souffle" crackers? To make them, the soda crackers are laid in a flat pan of ice water for eight minutes. Then the water is drained off and the crackers baked in a medium oven for 45 minutes. They should come out a light golden brown and flaky tender.

When drying curtains, if it is too much trouble to put up the stretcher, they may be hung on the regular rod at the window, running a heavier rod through the bottom hem and pulling the material straight. The curtains will be dry in half an hour without the disfiguring hole marks the stretcher makes.

Moro Boy Seeks Elective Post From Multnomah

Announcement of candidacy for representative in the Oregon state legislature from Multnomah county, has been made by Forrest E. Littlefield, former chief assistant United States attorney. At present he is associated with E. M. Morfen in the private practice of law with offices in the Yeon building.

Littlefield was in the federal prosecutor's office nearly five years. He resigned in 1929 to take over the work of his father, the late Judge E. V. Littlefield. Judge Littlefield also served in the legislature as a Multnomah county representative and was judge of circuit court in three Eastern Oregon counties for a number of years when the family lived at Moro, before going to Portland.

Hugh Road Building Program Planned For Year

States and local authorities plan to spend more than a billion and a half dollars for highway improvements during 1930, according to reports gathered by the United States Bureau of Public Roads from all parts of the United States. The estimated total is over \$1,601,000,000 and this is at least \$250,000,000 more than was spent during 1929. California, Oregon and Washington will spend a total of \$121,590,000, according to estimates for 1930 received by the Oregon State Motor Association.

The planned expenditure by state highway departments for construction and maintenance of state highways is \$937,500,455; the balance, \$663,607,000, will be spent, according to the estimates, on local roads and bridges. Highway officials of 45 states estimate the total length of roads to be improved by them in 1930 as 32,532, an increase of 3,126 miles over the estimate in the 1929 program. Three states failed to report for 1930. The highway departments of all states will control the maintenance of 281,393 miles of highways this year, an increase of 32,381 over the mileage under state maintenance in 1929.

At the request of Wasco the meet between our school and Wasco which was scheduled to take place April 5 has been indefinitely postponed.

Moro expects to go to Goldendale April 26 to take part in the contest between Klickitat and Sherman counties.

Eight scouts chaperoned by Mr. Hammersley took the hike to the Deschutes river Saturday, camping out that night and returning Sunday. The rain Saturday night, they reported, was slightly damp. The scouts who hiked were Tommy, Paul, and Gordon Fraser, Wayne Thompson, Harold Thogerson, Alton Astell, Russel Belshie, and Lloyd Henrichs.

The seventh and eighth grade room won the attendance banner last week with perfect attendance.

Class Taxation Increasing

Ninety-six times as much money was required from automobile owners to pay gasoline taxes in 1929 as in 1921; and the increase in 1929 was 47 per cent over 1928. While in 1921 gasoline taxes amounted to \$4,700,000, last year they reached the amazing total of \$449,731,000, according to reports from 35 states to the American Petroleum Institute and estimates from 13 states.

In a number of states the gasoline tax increased almost 100 per cent last year, and in none did it decrease. Gasoline is taxed in every state in the union with taxes ranging from two to six cents a gallon, or from 18 to 33 per cent of the retail price. This is believed to be the largest direct sales tax imposed on any commodity.

LIFE SKETCH OF SENATOR HALL

Republican Candidate Well Qualified for Position of Governor.

A quarter of a century ago, a young man, lured to Oregon by the call of the west, was swinging a shovel in a Portland sewer. As each day ended he would climb steep stairs to the fifth floor of the Tremont hotel—there was no elevator—to his \$1 a week room.

Today, with a fiction-like record of success behind him, the man—Charles Hall—stands before the public as a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. In 1922 he barely missed the nomination, losing by 500 votes.

He taught school three terms in Pennsylvania after completing his elementary education in a little red school house near his father's farm. When he stepped from the Portland sewer ditch, he taught a term at Clatskanie. This teaching experience gave him an intimate knowledge of educational problems in which he, as a state senator and leader in public life, has been actively concerned.

Hall, after leaving school work, was employed by an uncle in a drug store at Clatskanie. He saved systematically during his early years, and then engaged in timber cruising. He was successful and made enough to attend the University of Michigan 1905-06. In 1906 he returned to Oregon, where he acquired a drug store at Hood River. There he was active in the work of the Chamber of Commerce. For a time he was the organization's president. This gave him a vision of the possibilities of united effort. He was one of the leaders in organization of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce for more comprehensive efforts in behalf of the state, and was the first state president.

Going to Coos county, he took over a struggling rural telephone system which was undercapitalized and facing the problem of serving a rapidly growing but widely scattered area. He built and strengthened it until it was known for its efficiency, its friendly relationship with its customers, and its low rates.

A determined organizer and builder, he founded the Bank of Southwestern Oregon and later the American Bank of Marshfield. He was among the first leaders to see the commercial value of the Columbia river highway, and later entered many influential men to join the drive to put the project across. As chairman of the senate highway committee, he fostered much of the legislation for better highways.

If nominated and elected, he says, one of his first moves will be to start his "Industrialize Oregon" program by calling a meeting of representative citizens from each county in the state.

That by an order duly and regularly made by the State Game Commission of the state of Oregon, on the 10th day of March, 1930, it was found and determined that the supply of trout and other fish is being, and will be, injuriously affected by permitting the same to be taken with hook and line, commonly called angling, during the periods of time hereinafter specified from the streams and lakes of the state of Oregon hereinafter named; therefore:

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED. That on and after the 15th day of April, 1930, it shall be unlawful for any person to angle for, take, kill or have in possession, except as hereinafter provided, any species of trout or other fish of any kind or species in or from the following named and described streams and lakes of the state of Oregon, during the periods of time hereinafter specified, in accordance with the provisions of Section 8, Chapter 66, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, as amended by Section 1, chapter 275, General Laws of Oregon, 1925, to-wit:

Bass, crappies, catfish, perch and sunfish, closed season April 15 to July 1 of each year.

Black lake and Van Patton lake, situated in Baker county, closed until July 1, 1931. Crawfish lake, Rock Creek lake, Anthony lake, Grande Ronde lake, Mud lake, Duck lake, Fish lake, and Twin lakes, situated in Baker county, closed from September 15 to July 1 of each year.

Trout creek, situated in Clackamas county, closed for a period of ten years.

Twin lakes, Lava lake, Little Lava lake, Spotted Lake and tributaries, situated in Deschutes county, closed from September 20 to May 15 of each year. Three Creeks lake, situated in Deschutes county, closed from September 20 to April 15 of each year. East lake, Paulina lake and Paulina creek, situated in Deschutes county, closed from September 20 to May 15 of each year. Deschutes river from Snow creek to Deschutes bridge, in Deschutes county, closed from August 1 to June 1 of each year. Elk lake, situated in Deschutes county, closed until May 15, 1931.

Fish lake, situated in Jackson county, closed from August 15 to April 15 of each year. Applegate river in Jackson county, from a point on said river near the Applegate postoffice to and including the state line between California and Oregon on the Big Applegate, and including the headwater of the Little Applegate, and to and including the Carberry fork of Big Applegate, closed for a period of two years.

South fork of the Siletz river from the dam owned by the Cobb & Mitchell Lumber Company, including the mill pond above said dam in Polk county, closed from July 1 to April 15 of each year.

Young Men Are Invited

Enrollment records in the Citizens Military Training Camp at Vancouver this week reveal that Baker, Wheeler and Linn counties were the first in the state of Oregon to reach their assigned quotas of students applying for the 30-day C. M. T. C. training, June 20 to July 19. Enrollments have been made earlier than last year, there being three times as many signed up on April 1 as at the same date in 1929. Virtually half of the 700 applicants desired have signified their desire to attend.

That C. M. T. C. will be bigger and better this season is the assurance of Brigadier General Paul A. Wolf, camp commander. Athletics, sports, citizenship training, military drill and general health-building activities crowd the program for the 30 days, for the 700 young men of 17 or older who will be at Vancouver barracks.

All the expenses of the camp are borne by the government, for those boys who are accepted, including travel cost, uniforms, shelter, food and all needed equipment. Prospective students are urged to send their applications at once, to C. M. T. C. Headquarters, Vancouver Barracks, Washington, or to Ward Hammersley, principle Moro schools, at Moro, who is chairman of the Sherman county committee.

The Sandy river will not be the only Oregon stream noted for its smelt fishing if the state game commission has its way. Last week two truck loads of smelt were taken to the Yaquina river and there released. They will spawn in the stream, and it is hoped that the countless offsprings of these original smelt will return each year to the Yaquina and in time make the stream as popular for smelt fishermen as the Sandy. The department is also stocking the Clackamas river with smelt in an effort to make it a spawning place.
