Trained Nurse Will Work Month in Sherman County

County Superintendent Rakes has arranged with the county court for the services of a trained nurse to work in the county during the month, April 20th to May 20th, in the schools and the homes. The possibility of having the nurse for that time is brought about mainly through the children's selling the Christmas seals. For a small amount extra for expenses the Oregon Tuberculosis Association sends us a nurse for a full month. The nurse will come to work with the teachers and parents and pupils to do whatever she can to assist them in maintaining or regaining their health. The county being too small to have a full time nurse has caused those employing one to feel that we should have the services of an expert for at least a month out of the year.

Annual Spelling Contests

Much enthusiasm is manifest in the coming spelling contest. The local spelling contest, at which each school chooses its representatives to the final spelling contest at Moro, April 25th, is to be held in the different schools on April 18th. At the final spelling contest on the 25th those who merit it will be given a champion speller certificate. An oral champion certificate will be given those who wish to enter the oral contest, and who win, after the final writing contest is over. On the same date, April 18th at 2 p. m., the annual typing contest will be held at Wasco. This contest will be conducted by Superintendent Rakes.

Earns 400 Reading Awards

Under the plan for home reading, in which the child must read and make a report on two to five books, according to grade, there have been issued over 400 reading circle certificates so far this term. That is above any record yet made by the students of this county. Some students have made as many as three certificates. Several of the schools have reported 100% of the pupils having reading circle certificates.
