

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN FULTON

John Fulton, prominent Wasco and Sherman county pioneer, died at his home west of Wasco about 10 o'clock Friday night after a long illness at the age of 77 years.

John Fulton was a native of Oregon, born in Yamhill county May 24, 1852, son of Colonel and Mrs. James Fulton.

Mr. Fulton was educated in the public schools of Wasco county, entering Whitman college in 1866 and reading law for two years in The Dalles.

The day after their marriage they moved to their home near Wasco.

retaining this as their residence up to the present time. Mr. Fulton was elected Wasco county surveyor in 1880, serving until 1886, and after Sherman county was set aside in 1889 he served as county judge from 1892 until 1904.

His chief interest was farming, however, and his ranch near Wasco was known as one of the most modernly equipped in the state.

Mr. Fulton was active vice-president of the Old Wasco County Pioneers' association at the time of his death, and had been scheduled to give a talk on "Early Pioneers of Wasco County," at the May annual meeting of the organization.

WILLIAM A. MURCHIE

William A. Murchie, a resident of Sherman county since 1880, died Sunday, evening at a local hospital in The Dalles at the age of 71 years.

Mr. Murchie, after arriving here in 1880, settled on a farm in what is now Sherman county, where he lived continuously until after he retired from farming in 1917.

Mr. Murchie is survived by his wife and a daughter, Mrs. J. C. Ballinger, of The Dalles. Mr. and Mrs. Murchie had made their home with Mrs. Ballinger for some time.

JAMES VENABLE

James Venable, Sherman county pioneer, died at Spokane Friday at the age of 60 years. He was born at Klickitat, Wash., in 1869 and came with his parents to what was then Wasco county, in 1888, settling near Wasco.

Mr. Venable was married to Mrs. Rose Weld and Mrs. Eva Doane of Wasco, and Mrs. A. C. Smith of Silverton; two brothers, P. A. Venable of Elk, Wash., and John Venable of Washington, and two grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Wasco Methodist church, Rev. Falk officiating. Interment in the Wasco cemetery under the direction of Crandall's.

MRS. ANNA NEEDLES WALKER

Mrs. Anna Needles Walker was born in Kent county, Delaware, March 27, 1855, and passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Lewis Olds, near Grass Valley Monday, April 21, 1930, at the age of 75 years and 24 days.

On the 18th of January, 1877, she was married to Horatio M. Walker in Michigan. To them were born three children, one died in infancy and Ida and Fred surviving.

After their marriage the family moved to Nebraska and later to South Dakota. Mr. Walker's health having failed, they drove across country by team and wagon from Yankton, S. D., to the vicinity of Rutledge, Sherman county, where in 1895 Mr. Walker died.

She is survived by one sister; a daughter, Mrs. Lewis Olds of Grass Valley; a son, Fred Walker of Paulina, Oregon; three grandchildren, Danial Walker, Thelma and Alton Olds, all of Grass Valley.

In early life Mrs. Walker was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal church, remaining loyal to that church through all her life. She was a pioneer and the way of life was rugged. Few flowers were strewn in her pathway, she very courageously filled her place, did the work given her to do and now rests from her labors.

Moro School Notes

Miss Hillis, health nurse, was at the school Tuesday and Wednesday examining the pupils. Except for a few cases, she was well pleased with the health of the students and also with the way they have been instructed concerning hygiene.

In the track meet at Hood River Saturday Moro won in three of the five events entered. First place was won in the quarter mile and half mile relays, and first and second places in putting the shot.

On Saturday, April 26, Moro will be the scene of a meet between Klickitat and Sherman counties at the fairgrounds about 1:30 p. m. The towns scheduled to take part are Goldendale, Wasco, Glenwood, Rufus, Centerville, Grass Valley, Kent and Moro.

The typing team will leave at noon Friday for Corvallis to enter the contest to be held there on Saturday. During this week the team is drilling especially for accuracy, their average so far being two errors. Miss McCord and Mrs. Kunsman will drive cars to Corvallis.

In the county contest at Wasco Friday Lois Bryant made the highest net score in the amateur division with 69 words per minute and two errors, setting a record for Sherman county.

Marjorie Kunsman made the highest score in the novice division with 49 words. Lois Bryant was highest in accuracy, for which she was awarded a fountain pen. Moro averaged 55 net among four students against Wasco's team of two and Rufus three.

Moro was the smallest school entered among the 25 at Pendleton Saturday, but they succeeded in carrying away three awards. Lois Bryant received a silver cup for first place in accuracy with 6 errors; she also made the second highest net score in the entire contest with 63 words.

Three Schools Win in the County Typing Contest

County Typewriting contest was held in Wasco April 18th, and following are the results. This was one of the smoothest contests I've seen in Sherman county. Students showed good sportsmanship by congratulating the winners. The highest rates and the greatest accuracy were attained this year that the office here shows ever to have been attained in Sherman county.

Miss Lois Bryant took high honors in both speed and accuracy, having made a net rate of 69 words a minute for the fifteen-minute contest with only two errors. She will be given a nice fountain pen as an award for having made this record. Next was Miss Georgia Harper of Wasco, who made a net rate of 66 and seven fifteen hundredths words per minute with 28 errors, having written the full time at a rate of 85 and two fifteenths words per minute for the full time. Her errors cut down her rate to 66 plus. These two girls were in the upper division—second year of typing in high school.

In the novice division—first year of typing—Miss Marjorie Kunsman of Moro stands highest in her class with a net rate of 49. Miss Kunsman tied in errors with Chester Claude Coats of Rufus, both having made 14 mistakes during the contest. Chester Coats won the cup given for the highest team net rate in the novice division. Although Miss Kunsman wrote at a higher rate in this division, her grade had to be added to her team partner's grade and averaged for a team rate while Coats did not have a partner. It has long been the custom in the County Typing Contests for a school, if it has an outstanding typist, to enter only one in a division as a team. Then the grade of this one is the team grade of that division, while if the typing instructor wishes to chance two people writing in a division the average of the two, of course, is the team rate. This arrangement was made by the Principals' Association because of the small high schools, having few to pick from, would be materially handicapped, and could not enter a team at all.

The scores of the winners were: Lois Caroline Bryant, winner of the accuracy test, rate 69, Moro. Chester Claud Coats, winner of the lower-division cup, Rufus. Georgia Harper, winner of the upper-division cup, Wasco.
