Market Roads Are Essential

A good rule for any community to follow would be: Build them carefully. Many communities, in a passion for highway development have wasted millions of dollars by building the most expensive types of roads in areas where they were not justified by the traffic.

The greatest field for road progress at present is in building farm-to-market roads. There are tens of thousands of miles of such roads in the United States which should be improved and surfaced.

By using low-cost, long-lived waterproof surfaces, such as have been perfected with oils or asphalt, a state or county can at reasonable expense build several times the mileage of farm-to-market roads that would be possible if expensive pavements, of the sort used on main highways, were employed.

A high cost road in a section where traffic is small is an economic waste. We need more improved feeder roads every year and we can have them if available funds are distributed economically and efficiently.
