**New State Law Used**

**Persons Transporting Animals Must Carry Bills Of Sale**

First prosecutions under the new law requiring dealers to have bills of sale in their possession when they transport animals in the state resulted in fines of \$50 for each of three persons taken before District Judge Mears by Roy D. Larson, deputy commissioner of the Livestock and Poultry Theft Prevention service of the state.

Ben Weinstein, 755 First street, a cattle buyer; Fred Karg, Hillsboro meat dealer, and F. Kuenzi, 1445 Macadam street, driving for Carl Walther, Fulton market, were fined. Weinstein was charged with bringing cattle from Milwaukie and the other two from Washington county. Dr. W. H. Little, chief of the service and state veterinarian, has undertaken a campaign for the enforcement of the new law, which is section 9173 of the state inspection laws.—Oregonian.

**Sherman County Mothers Entertained at U. of O.**

Oregon mothers from Moro and every section of the state will be entertained at the University of Oregon on the annual Mothers' weekend, May 10 and 11, which is also the junior weekend celebration. Meetings for the mothers, organized at the last year's session, banquets with sons and daughters, as well as the various junior weekend entertainments, are all part of the extensive plans which are being laid.

Mrs. Walter M. Cook, Portland, president of the Oregon Mothers, will preside at the executive committee meeting which will open the session Saturday noon, May 10. Immediately following the meeting, the Associated Woman Students will entertain the mothers at a tea in Hendricks Hall. All the mothers will attend a mass meeting in Guild Hall at 4 o'clock, and at this time various problems which concern parents and students will be taken up.

The highlight of the weekend will be the banquet Saturday evening for mothers and their sons and daughters which will be held in Gerlinger Hall. Prominent people of the state and University will be among the speakers.

A special vesper service for the mothers is being arranged for Sunday at 4 o'clock in the music building.

**Farm Pointers**

Horses, more than any other farm animals, are sensitive to abrupt changes in feeding and in exercise.

Pollination by agencies such as the honey bee are necessary to set a good crop of many kinds of fruit, says the Oregon Experiment station. It is recommended that the bees be moved into the orchard before the blooming period begins. One colony for each acre of mature trees is necessary to insure full pollination.

There is only one way to be sure potato seed is certified—and that is when a blue tag is sealed to the sack with a lead seal, put there by a representative of Oregon State College.

About 70,000 enumerators started in April 2 on the work of taking the farm census, in conjunction with the population census.

The use of large amounts of roughage feed for hard working horses is not only wasteful, but detrimental to the horses, says the Oregon Experiment station.

Feeding experiments carried on by the dairy department at Oregon State college indicate that the feeding value of kale is nearly as great as that of average corn silage, when fed in the usual quantities. The kale is lower in nutrients, but this seems to be offset by its greater succulence, palatability and vitamin content.

**University Investments**

Herbert L. Shattuck, treasurer of Harvard University reports that the largest single item in the investment of the University's endowment is utility stocks representing \$18,538,241 out of the total endowment of \$92,978,139.

If the sums invested in railroads and traction stocks and bonds are included the total represents more than \$40,000,000 or almost half the endowment of the University.
