Home Pointers

(From School of Home Economics)
Paint is easily removed from win-
dow glass with hot vinegar.Old pieces of velvet are as good as
chamois skin for polishing.The wise hostess chooses a menu
which she can serve to the best ad-
vantage with the equipment she has
available.If a nail or tack is to be put into
plaster, it will be less likely to crack
the plaster if the point is first stuck
in soap.Liquid bluing serves the purpose
of ink very well for little children,
and is easily washed out of their
clothes.A very pleasing fruit cocktail is
made by using sections of grapefruit
and a mint syrup which has been
colored green.If each pair of soiled hose is
pinned together at the top with a
small safety pin when taken off, there
will be no hunting for mates after
laundrying.Scratches on mahogany furniture
can be concealed by painting the
scratches with iodine, then polishing with
a soft cloth dipped in furniture
polish.If a new broom is immersed in
boiling soapuds for a few minutes
and hung up to dry each week, it will
remain soft and pliable and will last
much longer.Running linen through a tight
wringer causes creases, that once
pressed are difficult to remove. Loos-
ening the wringer a little for linen
pieces will make the ironing easier.When a quantity of small fruit is
to be washed, less bruising will result
if it is poured into the water, rather
from one empty kettle to another and
the water added.The seventy-fifth annual conven-
tion of the Oddfellows and Rebekahs
of Oregon will be held in Portland,
Oregon, May 19th to 22nd. A
splendid program has been prepared
by the committee from the various
lodges in Portland. This session of
the Grand Lodge will take one of the
most progressive steps ever taken
in Oddfellowship when it adopts the
Junior degree of Oddfellowship as
authorized by the Sovereign Grand
Lodge in 1929. This degree admits
boys from 14 to 18 years of age and
will be under the supervision of the
Grand Lodge of Oregon. The Junior
Degree will be exemplified by a special
degree staff on Wednesday evening
May 21st, at the I. O. O. F. Temple.Sherman county on May 5th, re-
ceived \$35,894.70 tax payment from
the Union Pacific System, which re-
presents the first half of the Union
Pacific's 1929 tax. Payments of the
first half of 1929 tax is due at this
time. Payments of the last half will
fall due November 5th. According
to L. W. Hobbs, tax agent for the
railroad, the Union Pacific's total tax
in Oregon for 1929 amounts to \$1,
330,178.60 which places the road
among the heaviest taxpayers in the
state. This one and one third mil-
lion dollars is allocated as follows:
For education, \$665,419.29; for
roads, \$203,950.20; for cities, \$156,
258.14; for county general, \$136,
523.18; for state general, \$37,306.
71; for world war veterans, \$11,442.
38; for ports, \$13,987.06; for water
districts, \$2,029.89; for military
(National Guard), \$1,756.68; for
soldiers relief, \$1,498.07.
