

Russia's First Farm City

The first Soviet "farm city" is to be built in the Khorper region on a "collective farm" comprising 500,000 acres. The city will be built on the model of the new worker's town, with apartment houses provided with all facilities for communal living, such as large common kitchens and dining rooms, nurseries, etc. The "farm city" is designed to have 44,000 inhabitants, all the adults being connected with the collective farming enterprise in some capacity. A large dairy, two brick factories, and other projects will enable the workers to combine industrial and agricultural functions.

County Health Nurse Report Encouraging One

Report of work in Sherman county, April 21st to May 23rd, 1930. Margaret Gillis R. N. demonstration nurse Oregon Tuberculosis Association. Notes were sent regarding conditions of pupils to every parent. A total of 45 home calls have been made to parents of children; there are many more such calls should be made if time allowed.

Plans have been made for the care of some children at the end of the school year. One small boy was taken to the Doernbecher Hospital.

Every school in the county was visited and the pupils inspected, this meant a month of intensive work; after inspection a short period of time to talk with the pupils regarding conditions found, to discuss health habits, and to bring to them a more definite understanding of why they have Health Inspection, why the health side of their education is of marked importance, and certainly a very necessary part of it.

The response from the pupils was fine, they asked questions and were eager to talk more than our limited time would allow.

Every one was keen to know "how much do I weigh?" Here again it was impressed upon them, that we weigh them to know that they are actually growing in inches and pounds every six months, that this is the important part of the weighing and measuring; not so much to know that they are up to average; for their weight may be below or above average and yet be right for their type. And that to grow and build a fine straight body, there must be sufficient food of the right kind, adequate rest, fresh air at night as well as during the day, regular health habits must be formed, and kept every day, and all the days.

The majority of the children in Sherman county have very fine teeth, a large number of them have had and are having regular dental care; but there is marked need for more dental care; this especially where the permanent teeth are involved. Among the older students there are a number whose teeth and gums indicate a pyorrhea condition, calling for immediate dental care.

There is need for a lot of other corrective work, many children having bad tonsils, are mouth breathers, have ear ache occasionally, and a few whose hearing is affected. Also there are a number who have eye defects; we are hoping that much of this corrective work will be cared for during the summer vacation months. And in the matter of this corrective work, the final decision remains with your doctor, whether it is nose throat or eyes.

The health program in the schools throughout the county is very fine, in almost every school the teachers are instructing the children in applied hygiene.

A pre-school clinic was held at Kent on the morning of May Day, Dr. Foley of Grass Valley and Dr. Morgan of Moro examined twelve children. This was the Health part of the May Day program for the Kent school, and was a splendid way to observe May Day Child Health Day. We recommend that Kent make this an annual part of their May Day program; also there was a Health Poster contest, with some original and really interesting posters, and some very excellent copies of posters. A very lovely pageant with fine singing was also given. May Day Child Health Day, Oregon Day and May Day were all combined to make a very delightful and instructive program.

The teachers in all the schools assisted in every way possible to help in the inspection of the pupils. I sincerely appreciate their interest and help and wish to thank them for this. It was not always possible to notify the teachers of the time of my arrival at their schools, this because of my lack of knowledge of roads in the county. However, all schools were reached.

At Harmony an interesting conference was held with the parents of the children, all the parents being present during or after inspection.

Home Pointers

(From School of Home Economics)

When blanching fruit or vegetables, time and trouble can be saved by placing them in a wire basket, plunging the basket into boiling water for the required number of minutes and lifting out again by the handle.

A meringue will be less likely to fall if one-fourth teaspoon of baking powder is mixed into it. Careful regulation of heat also plays a large part in keeping a meringue tender and fluffy.

Fewer tears will be shed in extracting the juice from an onion if it is cut in halves and pressed in a lemon squeezer than if it is done by the usual method of grating.

A more flaky pie crust will result if the fat is cut into the flour and left in fairly large particles. It is well to fold and roll the dough several times to form separate layers with air held between them. An attractive appearance can be obtained by brushing the top of the pie carefully with milk or water before putting into the oven.

Like all dried foods, coconut is better if the moisture that has been removed by evaporation is returned to it before it is used in cooking. A good way to do this is to pour enough sweet milk over the coconut to cover it and let it stand in a cool place for an hour or more. Then drain it in a wire strainer, pressing as dry as possible. The coconut will be nearly as delicious as when newly grated. The milk may be saved to cook with.

To the man who considers all aspects of a political situation it may appear that Governor Norblad has started to pay his political debts incurred in the primary campaign. He has summarily removed Matt Corrigan from the state game commission and appointed David Evens to the office. Rumer states that R. W. Sawyer is to be removed from the state highway commission and M. A. Lynch of Redmond appointed and that Harry Poole of Klamath Falls will succeed Lynch on the game commission. Charges were made during the primary campaign that Sawyer would be removed so that the paving company would again be given contracts for "black top" and that less oiled surfacing be done on state highways.

Road Oiling Program in the State is Extensive

Oregon's highway oiling program for this year includes work on 911 miles of road in nearly 30 counties of the state.

Experiments are being conducted on almost every oiling job undertaken by the department in order to improve the specifications for all types of oiling and macadam work. A total of 338.78 miles of Oregon highways will be oiled this year, 171.21 will be oiled, 219 will be bituminous macadamized and 181.71 will be given the non-skid treatment Roy Klein, state engineer, said.

The non-skid treatment now being applied to black top roads in Oregon is the result of four years of experiment by the highway department. This year the department expects to apply the non-skid surface to practically all the black top roads in western Oregon north of Eugene and on the Columbia river highway between The Dalles and Portland.

The usual treatment consists of laying a mat of asphalt over the existing roadway, covering it with a layer of crushed rock, smoothing it out with a roller to take out the inequalities in the surface, coating with another application of asphalt followed by a thin layer of rock which fills the gaps and holes and leaves a non-skid surface. This treatment serves two purposes. It takes out the inequalities in roughness on the road and renders the surface non-skid.

On the newly reconstructed part of the Sherman highway, the work is under contract to J. F. Forbes of Olympia, Wash., and will be done with four series of oil application and crushed rock, each finer than the last and each rolled before the next oil is applied.

Three distinct types of oiling are now being applied to roads in Oregon. The first is known as the "oil mat surface treatment" which is a light application of oil with a small quantity of crushed rock which adds little to the stability of the road but tends mainly to prevent loss of material. It is used mostly on roads of little traffic or on roads on which permanent work is contemplated in the near future.

The second is the "road mix method," which is the method of scarifying the existing roadway and applying either light or medium weight oil, mixing the material and rolling it out over the road again. This method has proven very satisfactory.

The third type of oiling used by the highway department, known as "bituminous macadam" provides a permanent, non-skid highway surface, the heavier types of which are fully equal to cement paving with the saving factor of being much more economical.
