Commercial Club Meets Tuesday Evening, June 24

Commercial club organizations of Wasco, Grass Valley and The Dalles have accepted invitations to have representatives of their clubs meet with the Moro Commercial Club at its next regular meeting on Tuesday, June 24, at the banquet hour of 7:30

R. H. Kipp, secretary of the Columbia Valley Association, and Dr. Clarke Brown will be the principal speakers, following these speakers every one present will be asked to present views concerning the improvement and use of the Columbia river for power and navigation

Writing to the Sherman County Observer, under date of June 10, Mr. Kipp said in part:

"From present information, we should be ready to report soon after the 1st of July on the traffic conditions up the Columbia as far as Pasco and Snake to Lewiston, also on some of the loading and unloading facilities, but there are so many angles to the matter of navigation and the type of boats most desirable to meet all shipping conditions that we doubt whether the Port of Portland will be able to put out its report on this phase of the matter earlier than August, or possibly even as late as September, because they are hoping to develop more facts as to the possibility of at least two small barges going up as far as Patterson

"After considering the matter very fully for five months as a result of the careful investigation of plans and purposes of this association by special committee, the City Club of Portland practically unanimously adopted the program of the Columbia Valley Association at their meeting last week. This is considered one of the most careful clubs of business men in the city considering matters of this kind"
