

New Faces Appear In Extension Work

Director Paul Maris Announces
Many Changes in County
And Central Staffs

Numerous changes in the personnel of the Extension Service of Oregon State College have been approved by the State Board of Higher Education, and announced by Paul V. Maris, director of extension, during the past few weeks.

Among these are several additions to and changes in the central staff with headquarters at Corvallis, including the appointment of Mrs. Zelta Rodenwald, state home demonstration agent and in charge of home economics radio work, with Miss Forena Jenks as her assistant; Arthur King, at one time district agricultural agent in eastern Oregon, extension soils specialist; and Roger Morse, former Baker county agent, extension specialist in dairying to succeed the late N. C. Jamison.

In the 4-H club department, Miss Audrey Wiencien, 1928 graduate of the college, and formerly a prominent club girl, has been appointed assistant state club leader during the absence of Miss Helen Cowgill on sabbatical leave; L. J. "Doc" Allen, assistant state club leader, has been returned after a year's sabbatical leave; R. C. "Dick" Kuehner, in the central office during the past two years, has been appointed assistant county agent in Klamath county; and R. J. Maasko, Portland club agent, has returned from three months' leave of absence.

Home demonstration agents appointed include Miss Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent at large, with headquarters at Corvallis; Mrs. Sarah Cace, Columbia county, succeeding Miss Katherine Dittel, and Miss Thelma Gaylord, Clackamas county.

Other changes in county agent personnel are as follows: Philip Fortner, from Lake county to Baker county; Victor Johnson from assistant in Klamath to county agent in Lake; W. F. Cyrus, formerly assistant in Washington county, advanced to agent; W. S. Averill, formerly in Smith-Hughes work at Cottage Grove, succeeding Cyrus in Washington county; G. H. Jenkins, assistant in Umatilla

county, appointed agent in Coos county succeeding H. S. Hale who became agent at Twin Falls, Idaho; W. Wray Lawrence, assistant Malheur county agent, transferred to Wasco county agent; Gus Hagglund, 1930 graduate of the college, succeeding Mr. Lawrence in Malheur county, and E. M. Hauser, new assistant agent in Umatilla.

British Columbia Motorists Set Touring Record

Motorists of British Columbia apparently lead the world in touring, according to figures reaching the Oregon State Motor Association. These show that during the last year 110,000 Canadian cars came into the United States through British Columbia ports of entry, which is one for every six persons in the population of the Canadian province.

The same check shows that 186,000 American cars entered British Columbia at the eighteen ports of entry along the borders of Washington, Idaho and Montana. The population on the American side served by these ports of entry approximate nine million inhabitants, or nearly 15 times the population of British Columbia. It seems apparent from these checks on cars and population that in proportion many more Canadian cars came to this country than the number of United States cars which visit Canada.

Imported parasites of woolly aphid introduced in the Hood River valley by the Oregon Experiment station are proving effective in controlling the aphid and through this the spread of perennial cancer. A small insect, Aphelinus mali, has lived over two winters and has greatly reduced the woolly aphids in those limited areas where it was released.

The branch experiment station is now rearing the parasites by the thousands in cages that enclose a whole apple tree on which the aphids are placed. In one orchard where the parasites were liberated on six trees, they have spread through the entire orchard, practically eliminating the aphids, reports Superintendent Leroy Childs. The work is still in the experimental stage but holds real promise for success, he says.

Grangers Plan A Complete Program For 1931

Cooperative Marketing Heads
Projects Outlined At
O. S. C. Conference

Plans for putting the cooperative marketing program carried on by many of the subordinate agricultural committees of the state grange last year on a statewide basis for 1931 occupied the major attention of the joint conference of prominent grangers and extension specialists held at Oregon State college last week.

References were made to the excellent work in this field carried on during the past year in cooperation with county agents, in which Fred A. Goff, chairman of the agricultural committee of the state grange, mentioned that the cooperative lamb pools in Douglas county returned the farmers \$1.70 more per 100 pounds than they otherwise would have been able to get.

Meetings of all subordinate agricultural committees of the state grange will be held in the near future to consider local marketing conditions and possible improvements. These will be followed by county and district conferences under the supervision of three deputy organizers appointed by C. C. Hulet, state grange master. They are S. H. Edwards of Corvallis, northwestern Oregon; Arthur Brown of Roseburg, southwestern Oregon, and Charles Wicklander of Boardman for eastern Oregon.

Other grangers taking part in the conference included Bertha J. Beck, Albany, secretary of the state grange; Ray W. Gill, Portland; Dr. C. H. Bailey, Roseburg; Edward Shearer, Estacada, and Walter A. Pierce, LaGrande. Some matters other than cooperative marketing discussed during the meeting were the state meat dealers law, crop and price reporting, radio service and 4-H club work.

F. L. Ballard, county agent leader of the extension service, reported that 131 of the 275 subordinate agricultural committees of the state grange are carrying out some definite program of agricultural improvement in their communities this year, as compared to only 86 last year.

On Oregon Farms

In order to try out the idea common among many farmers that an increase in yield may be obtained by bringing wheat from the higher to lower altitudes, Harry Turner of Heppner has purchased a truck load of Hybrid 128 wheat from H. H. Huron, a certified wheat grower of Imbler, and will sow this wheat along side of local grown certified Hybrid wheat. A check on yields will be made at harvest time next year by County Agent C. W. Smith.

Irrigation has enabled J. A. Campbell of Polk county to pasture 25 cows throughout the summer on 10 acres of mixed Lodino clover, alfalfa and grass. Mr. Campbell uses a seven-horse power electric motor and a four inch centrifugal pump, and the water is carried about the naturally level field by ditches and flooded over it.

A project is being started in Crook county to determine the relation of alkali to scab on potatoes, County Agent W. B. Tucker reports. Farmers cooperating with the county agent in this study are J. C. Minson, E. N. Hall and R. R. Roberts, all of Powell Butte.

The fire hazard connected with spraying weeds with sodium chlorate alone was demonstrated recently on the Lowe ranch at Jericho Lane, when the friction caused by drawing a loaded sled across the spray plot started a fire which burned over the entire area. The area near the buildings, which had been sprayed with a mixture of sodium chlorate and calcium chloride, did not burn.
