Moro Men Buy Control of The Bank of Wasco

A business deal was announced this week whereby the financial group in control of the Bank of Wasco has sold their interests to local-Sherman county men, the transaction having been concluded this week.

A statement issued by the new owners of the Bank of Wasco says that F. R. Fortner end associates have purchased stock of the Bank of Wasco held by the Wasco Warehouse Milling Co.

Men associated with Mr. Fortner are Emil Andersen, J. F. Peters, F. E. Fortner, H. C. Ginn, A. B. Potter, C. A. Tom, and others. The above men, with Mr. Fortner are the directors.

The management will be in the hands of Mr. F. R. Fortner, who has been manager of the bank for the past twenty years.

Accepts Meier Chairmanship For Sherman County

Judge E. D. McKee of Wasco, republican county central committee man for Sherman county has accepted appointment as Sherman county committee man for the Julius Meier-for-governor campaign, it was announced this week from the Portland headquarters of the Meier committee.

Judge McKee was one of the republican state committee that met in Portland and nominated Metcans as the republican candidate for governor.

He has been a republican since he attained his majority. He supported Harry Corbett in the primary campaign with it, is said, George W. Joseph as second choice.

Judge McKee has served eight years as Sherman county commissioner and twelve years as county judge for Sherman county. He has operated a drug store in Wasco since 1899.
