day, October 27, and all day sessions
on Tuesday, October 28.Miss Elhara Thompson of the
University of Oregon school of social
work, is president of the group. Main
speaker will be Father Robert B.
Lucy, Los Angeles, a past president
of the California conference.

All American Celebration

Lieut. Col. U. S. Grant, 3d, Associate
Director, Stresses George Wash-
ington as the Nation's Heritage.All the national features of the
George Washington bicentennial cel-
ebration, under the direction of the
federal government, are being plan-
ned to be held, month after month,
in the city of Washington through
the year 1932.Lieut. Col. U. S. Grant, 3d, who
with Representative Sol Bloom, of
New York, is associate director of
the celebration, heralded as "the
greatest known to history," predicts
that an unprecedented number of
visitors will come to Washington
during that year—especially between
February 22 and Thanksgiving Day
when the observance will be concen-
trated.But Colonel Grant said that he de-
sires particularly to impress upon the
people of the country that this series
of celebrations will not be confined
to this city nor to any one locality.After referring to the principal
national celebrations that will be held
here and will doubtless draw an
enormous increase in the visitors
here in 1932, Colonel Grant added:
But this is not to be misunderstood.
No concentration of the celebration
is proposed in any one locality.
George Washington was the father
of the entire country, and as the hap-
py effects of his wise and patriotic
work extend to every corner of our
far-flung land, so should the celebra-
tion of the two hundredth anniver-
sary of his birth.As an army engineer Colonel
Grant has always taken a very
special interest in the life and work
of George Washington, particularly
those early years of his life when he
surveyed the trackless wilderness of
western Virginia for Lord Fairfax,
in his later ideas of "city planning"
for the capital of the nation, and the
various engineering projects which
Washington fathered, such as a
canal along the Potomac River to
make it navigable both ways for car-
go boats to Cumberland and then to
connect it by a canal with head-
waters of the Monongahela river and
the Ohio valley.With all of his other achievements,
Colonel Grant points out that Wash-
ington was an army engineer. He
might be called the first great en-
gineer of the United States Army.Colonel Grant says that all of 1932
will be a "George Washington year."
As an army officer, as well as a
citizen, appointed jointly to direct
the celebrations all over the Nation
with Representative Bloom, Colonel
Grant is lending his best efforts to
the plans for the monthly programs
that are to occur in Washington in
1932 and throughout the country.

thick with a value of 3000 ounces of
