A Chinese Pile-driver.
Piles being driven in one of the new buildings for a foundation for a punch. They were eight inches in diameter and fourteen feet long. The driving was done by a pile-driver, and so was the frame for the hammer, which was a mass of cast iron, with a hole in the center for a guide rod. Attached to the hammer block were two ropes, carried up to the top of the frame and down on the outside, looking very much like the old-fashioned Maypole. Twenty-seven women had hold of the ends, and with a spring, all together, pulled down; up the rod, four feet, traveled the hammer; then, at a scream, all let go, and down it came on top of the pile, which was protected by a band of ring. The women were paid in cents in gold per day. This Maypole driver is in general use throughout Japan and China.
