The only way to maintain parity is to make both metals a free legal tender and without discriminating against either metal. The Basin Disk.
The new disk steamship, the invention of M. Bazin, was launched at St. Denis dockyard, Admiral Coumbreault, who has a high reputation among French naval authorities, is said to be a firm believer in the possibilities of this new invention, and he has computed that only one-twenty-eighth of the power required to drive an ordinary boat is needed for a Basin craft of the same size and speed.
