The Rural Spirit has the following to say about the small farmer: The small farmer cannot live with his richer neighbor in buying farm machinery. He must either go into combination with neighbors or must grow the crops which do not require such machinery in their cultivation. More labor and direct expense may be greater returns and greater profits.

An exchange has well said: With butchers and packers scouring the country for live stock to meet current demands and paying remarkably good figures, and with large shipments continuing in from California and elsewhere, the foolishness of selling off cattle and hogs at the low prices received is becoming apparent. Whether profits are not to gain at present prices into live stock, there is coming a time when it certainly will pay again, and when the expense and loss incident to restocking Oregon's depleted ranges and hog supply is counted, the lack of wisdom and good judgment used will be very apparent.

Immense sales of yearling sheep have taken place in Crook county during the last week or ten days. As many as 25,000 horses are said to have changed hands. The purchaser was J. W. Blake, representing Dr. Wilson, of Wyoming. The prices have not been given out, but the Prineville Journal is assured that they were in the neighborhood of \$2.50 a head, after shearing. Of the gross number sold, R. E. Fortner sold 7000; Williamson & Sichel, 6000; Meyer & Brown, 2500; William Brown, 2000; Joe Meyer, 500; and C. Sayne, 500. Two years ago the highest price paid for such sheep after shearing was \$1.15, and very few brought that price.

A petition praying that the Columbia Southern Railway Co. build its line down to McDonald's bridge in Grass Valley canyon has been presented to the officials of that road. The petition sets forth the fact that the Monkland county raises about 150,000 sacks of wheat yearly, and that putting a side-track at this place would allow that wheat to go to market without being hauled up a long and tedious hill. Also, that considerable country over in Gilliam county would be attracted by a close proximity to a railroad. Such a business, coupled with the amount of incoming freight, is not able to say what the officials of the road will do, we are sure they will do as they always have, and treat all persons concerned fairly and equitably.

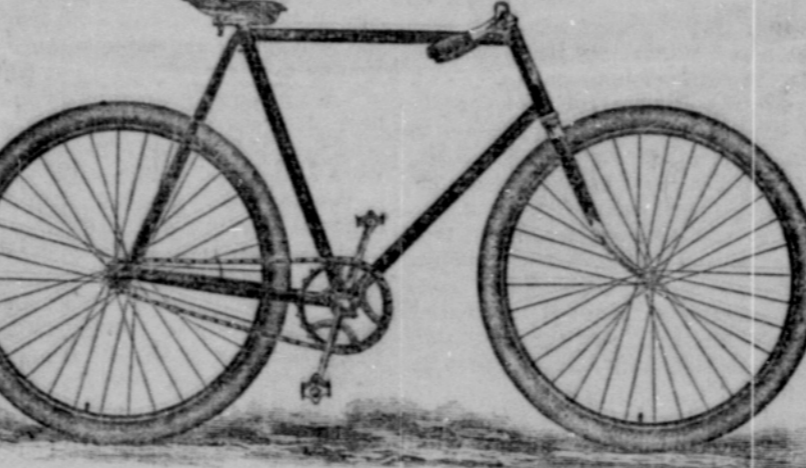

Is "Old Glory" Wanted?
 A prominent republican paper, that was so anxious to see McKinley elected, thus expresses its opinion: Shall the American flag be trailed in the dust by a barbarous nation? The conduct of the president has brought the blush of shame to the cheek of every loyal American, and we are confronted with the probability of being written down a cowardly nation. The country is better prepared for war now than it was in 1891, yet the government, or the president acting under the advice of Mark Hanna and the Wall street brokers, deliberately is holding back and allowing the enemy to fortify himself and gain vantage ground. It is not certain now but that matters have gone so far that in case of war the United States will get the worst of it. Were any of the European powers involved as is the United States, the climax would have been reached long ago. As it is this country is being given the laugh by other nations. "Old Glory" is on the wane. But it is not the fault of the people. The masses have urged the government at Washington to uphold the honor of the country, and the best blood of the nation is offered to sustain Old Glory. The spirit of him who unfurled the stary banner and said it should wave a thousand years, still lives in the hearts of his countrymen. The people looked to the message of the president for hope, but were sadly disappointed. Party and sectional strife set aside for the time being, the people denounced the message as powerfully weak, and dismay took the place of hope.

The president will go one step further. He will veto any measure taken by congress to punish the numerous banditti of Spain. This will give congress the final opportunity to take matters in its own hands and instruct the president for treason. What we need at this critical time is a Jackson or a Lincoln. If the country shows the white feather, skulls in cowardice, the people will never be able to lift up their heads in the face of the derision which will be our lasting disgrace. If the massacre of the Maine's marines goes unavenged who will we have to man our navies in the future? The people now appear to be of the opinion that they made a fatal mistake in elevating McKinley to the presidency.
