EASTERN OREGON'S LEADING MUSIC HOUSE.

An ordinance entitled "An ordinance to regulate the use of the streets of the city of Wasco, and to regulate the manner of issuing licenses."

Be it ordained by the common council of the city of Wasco:

SECTION 1. That no person, firm, company or corporation shall be engaged in, prosecute or carry on any trade, business, occupation, pursuit or profession within the limits of the city of Wasco, for which a license is required by any ordinance of said city, until he or they shall have obtained such a license as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. That any person, firm, company or corporation required by this ordinance to obtain a license of the city to obtain a license to engage in any trade, business, occupation, pursuit or profession for which a license is required, shall first pay to the city treasurer the sum or sums required by ordinance to be paid, and thereafter, upon receipt of the receipt of the city treasurer (which receipt shall set forth the kind of business for which license is required), they shall apply to the recorder, who shall issue a license to the parties applying, in accordance with the receipt of the treasurer, upon the compliance by the applicant with the provisions of all ordinances relating to obtaining licenses for the business, trade or profession for which such a license is required.

SEC. 3. Every license taken out under the ordinance of the city of Wasco shall set forth the purpose, trade, business or profession for which such license is granted, and the name of the person taking out the same, the time which the license is to run, the date on which the same expires and the kind of business for which license is required, and shall be subject to the provisions of all ordinances relating to obtaining licenses for the business, trade or profession for which such a license is required.

SEC. 4. In every case where more than one of the pursuits, employments or occupations for which a license is required shall be pursued or carried on by the same person, at the same time, license must be taken out for each, according to the rate severally prescribed.

SEC. 5. All licenses issued under the provisions of the ordinance of the city of Wasco shall be quarterly either as annual, semi-annual, quarterly, weekly or daily. All annual licenses shall expire on the 31st day of December in each year; all semi-annual licenses on the 30th day of June and the 31st day of December; all quarterly licenses on the 30th day of March, the 30th day of June, the 30th day of September and the 31st day of December of each year; and all annual, semi-annual and quarterly licenses, issued after the beginning of the term shall expire on the first day of the month in which the liability therefor occurred, and may be issued upon payment of such proportion of the whole amount as shall be due for the term for which said license runs bears to the full term, and daily, weekly and quarterly licenses may be issued at any time, and no license shall be issued for a less time than the shortest term named and provided in the ordinance providing for said license, except as otherwise specially provided for by any ordinance of the city, and no license shall be issued for a longer term than the shortest term named and provided in the ordinance providing for said license, except as otherwise specially provided for by any ordinance of the city, and no license shall be issued for a longer term than the shortest term named and provided in the ordinance providing for said license, except as otherwise specially provided for by any ordinance of the city.

SEC. 6. All licenses require by this ordinance shall be paid in advance in gold and silver coin.

SEC. 7. Any person or persons, firm, company or corporation who shall engage in, prosecute or carry on within the limits of the city of Wasco, any trade, business, occupation, pursuit or profession, for which a license is required by this ordinance or any ordinance of the city of Wasco, without first obtaining such license as herein provided, or who shall violate any of the terms of this ordinance relating to the obtaining of such license, shall be deemed to be in violation thereof, and shall be liable to a fine not more than five dollars, or by imprisonment not more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SEC. 8. Auctioneers, who follow their vocation in the day or night time, shall pay a quarterly license of ten dollars, or five dollars per day or night. Auctioneers, who follow their vocation both day and night, shall pay a quarterly license of fifteen dollars. Every person shall be deemed an auctioneer, who, by the terms of this ordinance, whose business it is to offer property for sale at public auction.

SEC. 9. Every person or association of persons who shall peddle any goods, wares or merchandise for sale within the limits of the city of Wasco, except such as are the product of their own gardens or orchards, or articles of their own manufacture, shall pay therefor the sum of twenty-five dollars per month, or five dollars per week, and no license shall be granted for such purpose for a less term than one week.

Hawkers shall pay a license of ten dollars per day or forty dollars per week. Any one who offers goods for sale by outcry on the street or who shall conduct business from a stand on the street, shall be deemed a hawker under this ordinance.

SEC. 11. Any person who shall, within the limits of the city, set up and run any photograph gallery in which photographs are taken, in any tent or temporary or movable structure, or shall, without being permanently located in a permanent building, solicit orders for, or sell any photographs or pictures, or without being
