It is more appalling since just at this time we hear of such unparalleled bravery and heroism down at Manila and at Cuba. Every American heart fills with disgust and shame to think that out of that passenger list, of which over two hundred were women, only one was saved. It was a case of the strong against the weak. Barley sailors used clubs, oars and even knives against inoffensive women and children, even knocking them off the lifeboats after they had succeeded in swimming clear of the maelstrom. Such an occurrence finds but little place in history. Thank heaven, they were not Americans!

At last the only solution of the Hawaiian question has been worked out, and the "gem of the sea" has become the property of Uncle Sam. It is natural that these islands should belong to us, and it would have saved considerable expense to have taken them long ago. The United States doesn't need or want any more territory. And the only reason why we need Hawaii is because the little island government is not strong enough to exist of itself, and we cannot afford to allow any other nation to come into possession of them. It has been apparent all along that we would own them sooner or later.

Congress has completed its labors and adjourned. Thus it may be seen that war does some good. It caused them to quit bickering, get down to business, pass a few needed measures and get out of the way. Now let the branch have full sway.

MELLOWED WHISKY.

A Bottle of the Stimulant Lies in a Tree Trunk Thirty-Six Years.
Thirty-six years ago a man named Jones, who was employed by Frank Lockwood of this town, says a Stamford (Conn.) correspondent of the New York Sun, was at work on Mr. Lockwood's farm, and as a stimulant he took out to the lot with him a pint flask of prime whisky. During the morning Jones took one nip, and seeing his employer coming, he slipped the bottle in a hole in a tree standing near, intending to return and get it after Mr. Lockwood had gone home.
