He knows when a piece of work is well done, and he knows how to get the most work and best results for the least expense; and he has found that these machines, properly handled, will give him more grain to the acre, a cleaner and more marketable product, and at an expense of about one-half that of the old-fashioned way costs. 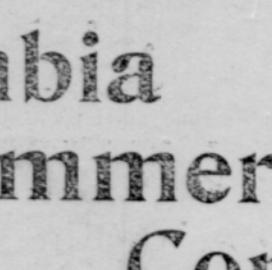
