While our city dials are wrestling

with the proposition of a set of laws

to govern us, it is well for them to

consider the subject of garbage. True,

the town is not very large, but, never-

theless, considerable garbage collects in

a very short time, and it becomes a health

nuisance, as well as a menace to filthy

something should be done with it. At

the present time only one place—a

hotel—lures its garbage hauled away.

The rubbish from other places is left

within the limits of the city; and often

in back yards. This ought not to be.

An ordinance ought to be passed com-

pelling people to have their garbage

hauled away. The individual cost

would be light, and there is enough of

that sort of work in the city to furnish

somebody a living. Or, better yet,

the plan of some other towns might

be followed. Los Angeles has splen-

d sewage outlets to the sea, and yet

she does not use them. The garbage

of that city is sold to the farmers

and used for fertilizing purposes; this

at once disposing of the question satis-

factorily to the city, and deriving a

revenue to the city. This plan might

be made successful here. It would

not matter whether or not any re-

venue was derived. We would be ahead

if we were only rid of the refuse. Any-

way, it is a matter worthy of consid-

eration.

Whether or not the United States

retain possession of the territories tak-

en begins to be agitated on both sides.

The war was originally not supposed

to be a war of conquest, but new

things developed that often changed

the course of events. This seems to

be the case now, and it is more than

probable that the Philippines, Haw-

aii, and in all probability all other

possessions acquired, will be kept.

The following, from an interview with

Senator Davis, is very positive and has

much bearing on the subject: "We

are entering upon a new era. The

flag will not be lowered from Hawaii,

and the fate of the Philippines is linked

with the destiny of the republic. This

nation, in the near future, is to be-

come the leading factor in international

politics. We cannot retreat to our

former policy of isolation. In the do-

main of the Pacific ours is henceforth

the paramount power, and we cannot

escape the responsibility. The future

of an unborn empire of the west—the

farthest west, that borders on the east

again—lies in our hands. I believe we

shall be equal to the responsibility.

We can take care of all the possessions

we may acquire and comfortably

shoulder all the tremendous duties we

may assume."

The difference in the fatalities in shipwrecks depends on who mans the vessel. Only a short time since a French liner went to the bottom, only a few passengers and but one woman being saved.

A story of unusual cruelty was told. And now an American ship is turned off the Atlantic coast. A large portion of the cargo is oil and ammunition; but American sailors and officers were on that ship.

No outcry is heard. Swiftly an officer knocks at the door of each stateroom, saying an accident had happened, but to remain cool, as all would be saved.

As they proceeded upon deck officers met them with words of encouragement; and boats were lowered, manned by sturdy seamen. Not a man was allowed to embark till every woman had been taken care of; and then the boatmen were ordered to keep out of the surf and cruise about at a safe distance.

They came the men; and not till the last one was safe did the captain and remainder of his crew think of themselves. As every boat was gone they put to sea just as the fire reached the oil and ammunition. Every life was saved. Such is Americanism.

It's a shame that a naval commander of Sampson's age and experience should try to steal honors he has no right to. The victory at Santiago was Schley's, and yet Sampson failed to inform the government that such was the case.

The American army and navy will gain high honors, but Sampson and Miles will have no place in them. It's the men who actually do the deeds of heroism whom the American people love.

And now it develops that the mouth of the Columbia river was never mined at all; and that all the official display there was a mere bluff. It's just as well. The Spaniards had all they could attend to dodging the mouths of the big guns without looking for the mouth of the Columbia.

Water protection in Wasco is scarcely sufficient to allow firecrackers and bombs to be sold and exploded promiscuously. It will cause a fire some day. Our business men who have no regard for the safety of their property should be forced to regard it anyway.

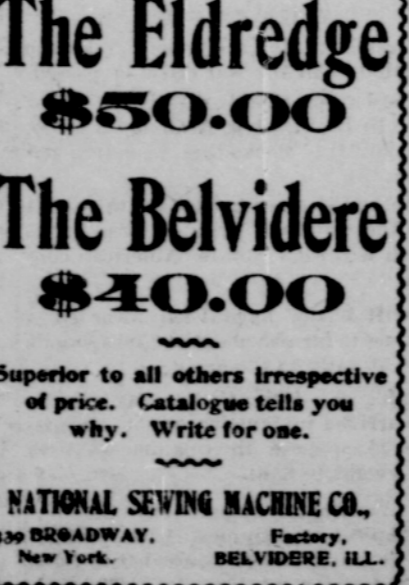
