From Dawson City.

DAWSON, June 20, 1898.

We arrived in Dawson the 13th of June, starting from Cariboo crossing the 1st of June. Got through White Horse and Five Fingers all right.

There were three men drowned in White Horse the day we got there, and a few others since. Better weather never prevailed in any country than we were favored with on our trip in.

It is amusing to see the look of disappointment on the face of the average newcomer. Seventy per cent of the people who come here expect to begin picking nuggets from the moss roots; and now when they are told that all claims or districts of known value are already represented it puts another damper on their enthusiasm.

Hundreds have already started for St. Michaels in small boats, expecting to get steamers there. While others say they will take out a sack or leave their bones in Alaska.

Dawson is a red hot number. I will quote a few prices prevailing here now. Men's, from \$2.50 to \$5; day board, \$10; bacon, 60c; butter, \$1; eggs, \$3; flour, \$10; sugar, 90c; coffee, \$1; fish, \$1.50; tobacco, \$3; snow packs, \$15; wolf robes, \$100. Through the winter everything brought \$1.50 per lb. But so many "cheap chancers" selling out to get away from the country will bring everything down very low. A small cabin on Main street brings \$300 per month rent. To smoke any kind of a cigar costs 50c; and a two bit piece is not in it, 50c being the smallest money you can pass here. One man paid \$10 for 10 small potatoes. Another gave \$60 for a ten pound salmon. They must have a chance of food at any price. Scum is prevalent here now. There are from 70 to 100 cases in the hospital most of the time, and many cases are fatal. I met Hank Putnam, who was marshal at Arlington some years ago. He has the scum, and will get away on the first boat. I also met Billy Devine, who was reported drowned on the up trip. He also looks a little the worse for wear, having lost forty pounds in weight. A party from The Dalles arrived yesterday. One of the boys says he is no hog. He knows when he has enough, and will start out soon.

Last night 3 men got in from above with 10 head of rather small beef cattle. He sold them readily for \$600 each, or \$6000 for the bunch. Moose meat sells at \$2.25 per pound. When the prices of 1898 reach the outside, many will prepare to bring in cattle and sheep next spring, and get beautifully left, for grub will be plentiful after the thin-skinned pilgrims have vacated their way through the labyrinthian meanderings of the mighty Yukon to St. Michaels. Oh, my! Won't they have a tale of woe to tell their friends if they ever get back!

I met Josquin Miller today. He has the appearance of having been "at this feed for some time." Told me, however, that he was "quick as a gun yet," whatever that means.

There is no "che chanco" money here; everything is settled with "dust," and one must have his scales if he expects to do business. Last winter the saloon men run out of "goods," so they resorted to a liquid known as "hoosh," obtained from rice and sugar. This went at from 50c to \$1.50 per hoosh. "Banquet" bacon and beans has been more in evidence here in the past than anything in the line of "grub," with rice for a Sunday luxury. Today I am baking bread like mother used to make. This is my first attempt. If I am successful, here goes for living whites. Before me as I write lies a pick, shovel, axe, and some extra handles; though to tell the truth I don't
