Prof. H. W. Riley, the Chemist of the Agricultural Department at Washington, has been conducting a series of experiments to determine the value of different meats as foods. Some of his opinions about preparing and cooking meats will surprise the careful American house-keeper and we are disposed to question them. His report of his investigations, however, is interesting and valuable. "Meats," says he, "should never be eaten until they have become properly ripened; that is to say until they are about ready to decay. A chicken killed today ought to hang three weeks in a cool place before going on the table. The same with other meats; it should be kept three weeks, then there would be no danger of eating diseased meat."

The state board of immigration has called a convention to meet in Portland, Saturday, Jan. 21, 1909 at ten o'clock A. M., composed of editors, mayors, county judges and commissioners, members of the legislature and such representative citizens as may be appointed by mayors, county judges or commissioners, to discuss and compare notes that the matter of immigration may be handled uniformly throughout the state. It is a good move.

Liquid hydrogen is in all respects the most extraordinary fluid chemists have had to deal with. Ordinance No. 21.
 An ordinance entitled "An ordinance to provide for licensing the hauling and transportation of persons and property for hire within the corporate limits; to prohibit the same without license, and providing penalties for the violation thereof."

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Wasco: SECTION 1. That no person or persons, firm or corporation shall, directly or indirectly, engage in the hauling or transportation of, or haul or transport for hire, within the corporate limits of the City of Wasco, any person, or persons, baggage, merchandise, lumber or any other property, nor haul, transport or convey for hire any rock, stone, brick, gravel, earth, ballast, manure or other article or thing, whether used in grading, excavating or repairing the public streets or highways, or grading, excavating, or repairing or improving private property, or in repairing or erecting public or private buildings, cellars, vaults, structures or superstructures, whether by the day, contract, hire, or single trip or other rate of compensation without having first obtained a license therefor.

SEC 2. That any person or persons, firm or corporation desiring to engage in hauling, conveying or transporting any person, persons, property, rock, stone, earth, brick, gravel, manure or other article or thing mentioned in section one of this ordinance, shall before engaging therein, procure a license therefor from the Recorder.

SEC 3. That all licenses issued under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be for the term of period of one year, and the fee or charge for each license so issued shall be \$3.00 for each team of two horses, mules or other animals and the further sum of \$5.00 for each additional team.

SEC 4. That the City Recorder shall before issuing such license require the applicant therefor to be made in writing and the same together with the Recorder's receipt for the amount thereof, filed in his office. He shall thereupon issue to such applicant a license in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance and such license shall not be transferred nor assigned.

SEC 5. That any and all persons, firms and corporations licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, in handling, conveying and transporting any and all property entrusted to their care, and any carelessness or negligence resulting in the injury to property and damage to employer or other person, shall be sufficient cause for revocation of such license.

SEC 7. That no such license shall be revoked except by the Common Council upon complaint filed, and upon ten days notice to such licensee and hearing thereon, and if it appears to the Council that such licensee has been guilty of culpable negligence or carelessness that will revoke such license and no license shall be issued to such person, firm or corporation except upon a good and sufficient bond to be approved by the Council, for a period of six months.

SEC 8. That this ordinance shall not be construed as to apply to or prevent persons, firm or corporation from hauling, conveying, moving or transporting his their or its own property, or any rock, stone, brick, earth, gravel, ballast or other article or thing for grading, excavating, repairing or constructing any cellar, vault, structure, or superstructure for his, their or its own use and benefit; nor to the hauling, conveying or transportation of persons or property from beyond the city limits to any point or place therein, or passing through the same, or from any point or place therein to any point or place beyond the corporate limits thereof.

SEC 9. That any person, firm or corporation who shall, upon conviction thereof, before the Recorder's Court, be punished by fine not less than five nor more than fifty dollars.

SEC 10. That this ordinance shall be in force and effect on and after its passage by the Common Council, and publication.

Ordinance No. 19.
 An ordinance entitled "An ordinance in relation to attendance of councilmen and prescribing penalty therefor for nonattendance."

SEC 1. That it shall be the duty of all members of the council, when in the city, to attend every regularly appointed meeting thereof, and may be summarily arrested upon the order of the council and compelled to attend.

SEC 2. Every member of the council having an excuse for non-attendance shall have the right to present the same and if the council deem it sufficient they shall excuse his non-attendance. If however such excuse is not accepted and the delinquent excused, the council may punish him by fine of not less than one nor more than five dollars. And may in case of three unexcused absences, expel a member, declare his office vacant, and proceed to fill the same as provided by law.

SEC 3. Any member of the council who shall at any meeting be guilty of any violent or disorderly conduct, or who shall indulge in any profane or abusive language, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and may be punished by fine of not less than one nor more than ten dollars.

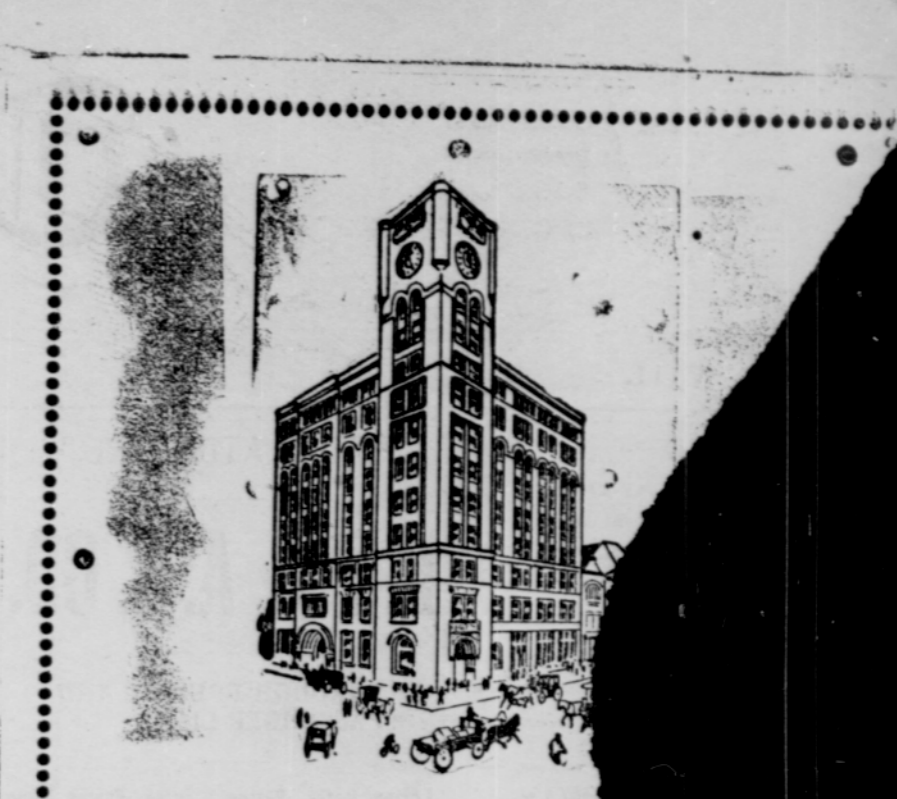
