Since the American soldiers have been sent down to the trenches followed by the Filipinos there is not much sympathy shown them. They are a cruel people, almost barbarous. Since they have burned a few prisoners the soldiers have got their eyes open, and it is natural, when they see such things, for them to lose their sympathy.

Dewey must think the most of the trouble at Manila is over. At least, he is now willing to come home. He will start in a few days, and will bring the Olympia with him. He will come via the Suez canal. This means the Pacific coast will not get a chance to welcome him.

The White Ribbon Assembly. The tenth annual convention of the W. C. T. U. was held in the school hall in Wasco the 10th and 11th of May.

The decorations that met our gaze as

Convention called to order by county president, Mrs. Maggie Eaton, and the opening devotionals conducted by Mrs. L. H. Addison, who is state and national organizer and lecturer, and who came in response to an invitation to be present and assist in the convention.

Committees were appointed and after the noon hour of prayer all were invited to the floor below, where refreshments were served.

At 1:30 p. m. a large number gathered for the afternoon exercises, which opened by singing and prayer, after which the regular order of business was taken up.

Reports of officers showed that some good work had been done, notwithstanding the work of Satan has left its tracks and is still tiding, ready to do his bidding, while on the other hand the reports show that some good work has been done, and that the interest in the work is increasing.

Next was a medal contest, essays on "noblest," there being six contestants. These papers were all excellent and showed the many phases of the question and the evils arising therefrom, and all were urged to investigate these things. They also showed the great interest taken to bring before the minds of the people the facts concerning these things.

Each paper was well composed and deserved a prize. After words of commendation to each one Mrs. Addison presented the medal to No. 4, from the pen of Mrs. Ora White, of Moro, read by Mrs. L. A. White.

The question box was next opened, and Mrs. Addison proceeded to answer the questions; and much information was gained, although some were a little disappointed, as there were a few questions she did not care to answer.

Thus closed the most successful convention the W. C. T. U. ever held in the county. Mrs. Addison being an inspiration all the way through from beginning to its close.

The evening exercises consisted of a double contest, oratory intermingled with vocal music. Each one carried out their part well. There were six contestants in each, and while the judges were deciding the audience was favored by a solo by Mrs. Croft, followed by a solo by Mrs. Brock. The judges having come to a decision, after a few well directed words of commendation to each one, the medals were awarded, to Shirley Barnett for oratory, title, the tale of a serpent; or, a woman's logic; and to Mrs. Hordford of Moro, for singing, title, Marguerite.
