The Corvallis Times has discovered that Corvallis stands greatly in need of the co-operative spirit among her citizens. "The people," says the Times, "do not always pull together. One citizen has one notion and another differs with him. Each has followers, and when a public matter is to be disposed of the two plans go to pulling in opposite directions to accomplish the same object. How to secure the improvement of the road south of town recently became a matter of much public concern in Corvallis. Every man in town was heartily in favor of putting the road in condition. Some undertook to bring the improvement about by one plan, and another body of citizens started out to accomplish the same thing by a different method. They did not co-operate, they were not harmonious, all were not united in the movement, and in consequence the road matter has been practically dropped. The available moment when harmonious action would have forced the movement to a successful issue has passed. The interest in the road has in a large measure exhausted itself, and it will be difficult to resurrect it." Here we have an example of what ails the Willamette valley. Individualism of the intense type, which seems compromise, is the dominating spirit in the Willamette. It has its merits; it makes a strong and self-reliant people. But it does not promote community interests—Oregonian. The above contains advice that even Wasco people could follow with profit.

Let no one censure the Oregon volunteers too severely for choosing San Francisco and travel pay instead of Portland and a big reception. To a man who is preparing to lose his job with no certainty of getting another at once, a sum equivalent to two months' pay is a big temptation, and one that few of us would be able to resist under like circumstances. The boys have not been looking at the big reception Portland was preparing to give them from the same point of view that the people of Oregon have. In fact, they have known very little about it, and had they known it is doubtful if they would have sacrificed \$30 each to make a holiday for Oregon. It is true they have not shown the appreciation of Oregon's good intentions that they should, but this is not a day of exhibitions of appreciation, when there is cold cash lined up on the other side.

On June 6th the J. C. Ayer company offered Rudyard Kipling \$1000 for a poem of eight lines, two stanzas. The work was to have appeared in the forthcoming Ayer's 29th Century Book. On June 15th, Mr. Kipling positively refused. If the poem had utilized fifty words, the offer of the Ayer company was at the rate of \$20 a word, and if the average word consisted of five letters (for Kipling's father of short Saxon than of lengthy Latin) the offer was at the rate of \$4 a letter.—Printer's Ink.

The once wasted cornstalk is now a highly prized product of agriculture. It yields cellulose, worth \$400 per ton stoppings holes in battleships, fine cardboard and paper, the best foundation for dynamite, a patent cattle food and a superior glue.
