Representative Hepburn, of Iowa, announces that he will, on the first day of congress, introduce the Nicaragua canal bill, and in this he should receive the hearty and undivided support of every member from the coast states on both sides of the continent, for the building of the canal means much to the coast states in bringing them closer together and giving them less arbitrary freight rates. To the Pacific coast states the matter of opening the Nicaragua canal is of the greatest importance, for they will thereby be brought closer to the markets of the world, and the cost of the transportation of their products, especially wheat, will be reduced by nearly one-half.—Mountain.

It now transpires that the Leonids due last Thursday have deferred their visitation for a whole year, and that to some extent articles referring to the "shower" this year are wrong. All last week at this place the sky was beautifully clear right up to Saturday, and outside of a few shooting stars which might be seen any clear night, there was no display whatever. It looks as though the astronomers took it for granted the shower would come, for the dispatches in some cases were printed and issued to the public before the periodical shower could have come off as per contract.

American, English and German flags, it is said, were floating side by side at the Kaiser's reception at Windsor; and this is brimful of significance, disclosing an amity between the three nations far more than an hundred treaties could. For it shows that, whatever conflicting interests the countries themselves may have, the hearts of the yomany—the great middle class on which nations rest—are beating in unison. When this feeling predominates the world over, armies and navies will be no more. They will have outlived their usefulness.

The report in the Stevenson Pioneer of the finding of placer gold in the crop of a grouse killed on Wind River, Wn., will surprise no one who has ever gone through that country without prejudice as to its mineral-bearing qualifications. It has long been suspected of containing precious metals, but so long as mining capital persistently ignores all the "signs" there can be little hope for the development of the region. It is possible, however, that the grouse may have come from almost anywhere else.

Buller's army is closing in on the burghers by this time in earnest. In a few days more we may expect to hear of carnage in battle that will make the very flesh creep; for the Boers will retreat gradually from Natal and Kimberly and Making to the Free State, and there make their stand. The Free State once entered, the queen's own will have comparatively easy sailing into Pretoria.

Our first census, made in 1795, the Ladies' Home Journal says, showed the population of the United States to be five million, and the count cost Uncle Sam, who was comparatively poor then, one cent for each person. It is estimated that the twelfth census, to be made in June, 1900, will show that our people number seventy-five million, and that the item of clerk hire in the census bureau alone will exceed five million dollars.

If reports of Boer losses in killed and wounded are anywhere near correct, there cannot be more than five or six thousand men left available for service. They have been falling at the rate of 300 a day for some time.
