The new registration law is, as is usual with such laws, destined to work a hardship on some honest voters before it is amended or repealed.

The writer has legally voted for three presidents, and now is compelled to lose his vote through being born a subject of Queen Victoria and immigrating to this country at the age of two, and acquiring citizenship by virtue of his father's naturalization. That is, he is compelled to produce his parent's papers or take out his own after voting for three presidents. The law is presumably intended as a means to defeat election frauds in cities, and therefore a just one; but it will likely cost all parties numerous votes. There is no provision covering such cases, of which there are at least two in this city.

About the best take-off we have ever seen came from Moro Saturday in the shape of a notice quarantining that city against Wasco. We are almost tempted to think it a joke. The idea of a city having 72 cases of smallpox protecting itself against one which has only three! It is ridiculous. Still it is not smallpox they have at Moro, you know, but only the Moro itch. But joking aside, Wasco will be heartily glad when the quarantine between the two cities is raised. It is absolutely necessary that business be resumed as quickly as possible between Wasco and Moro. A great deal of inconvenience is caused by the quarantine regulations now existing. Should they continue much longer some one will be in sore straits.

For all the bad reputation Wm Goebel had among republicans, he had his good points. He was the most remarkable politician Kentucky has had since the days of Henry Clay and John C. Breckinridge. He did not smoke or drink. He was the enemy of the trusts and corporations. He had killed his man. An agnostic, he kept up his dead mother's membership in the church she belonged to. Without a collegiate education, he was the active partner of two of the greatest lawyers of recent times in Kentucky. He did not gamble, and was the author of the law making gaming a felony in the state.

Moro now has a saloon, the city council having granted a license to "Doug" Radley. Moro, like Wasco, fought the saloon for a year before admitting it; but like Wasco again, we venture the assertion, now she has it, it will stay as long as it is run in an eminently respectable manner.

The battle of Spionkop must have been a severe one, if the losses are any indication of severity. Nineteen hundred British and seventeen hundred Boers hit the dust. Surely both sides must have good cause for fighting, or such losses as this would cause both to quit.

Mexico knows enough about insurrections to appreciate the fix England and the United States are in just now. She is in the thick of one herself at the present time, and she has just lost one of her ablest generals.

After looking over the mining news that appears in our leading dailies, the prospector doesn't know whether to tackle Cape Nome, Eastern Oregon or Southern Oregon in his search for the yellow metal.

Dr. Doane, of The Dalles, pronounces the disease smallpox. That city is now wrought up over a man having it visiting several stores in The Dalles. Let us hope the disease will not spread further.

We understand a movement is on foot by the Moro citizens who subscribed the \$600 necessary to secure the building of the courthouse at that place, to repudiate the donations subscribed for. A petition was circulated containing numerous signatures asking that the county court cancel the obligations and assume the \$600. This in our opinion should not be permitted. The courthouse was built largely through Moro citizens subscribing \$600 out of the \$6000 necessary for its construction, and it is in decidedly bad taste for the donors to back down now that it is built. Our county court should and will see that this steal is not allowed.

English Officers Degenerating. An important statement was made by Mr. Wyndham in the house of commons Thursday, namely, that the vacancies he was made among the officers would be partly filled by promotion from the ranks. This means the democratization of the army. On this subject a letter, which is attracting much attention, appeared in Friday's issue of the Daily Chronicle. It was written by a British officer who knows most of the armies of Europe from personal observation and who has seen much service. He plainly declared that the class of society from which the British officers are drawn is "intellectually degenerate, due to lack of intellectual training and the dissipation and vice of the aristocracy," and that the class "commonly known as society provides 99 per cent of the officers." The writer also says: "The intellectual standard of the young man of 17, fresh from the English public schools, is lower than that of a German board school boy of 8. His time is devoted to athletic sports. As his ancestors have done he marries a girl of the same training and in three or four generations society will consist of physically splendidly developed idiots." The only remedy according to the writer, is "intermarriage between society and the healthy middle classes."

The situation in Kentucky is a very trying one. We might also add that it is a very dangerous one, for Kentuckians, as a rule, are reputed to favor the use of firearms rather than brains.

Appraisal of Dewey's Captures. The secretary of the navy has transmitted to the supreme court of the District of Columbia a copy of the report of the board of appraisal and survey, which was convened at Cavite, June 6, 1898, to place a value on the property captured by Admiral Dewey's fleet in Manila bay. The estimated value of these captures is \$326,141. The largest items in the statement are: "Ship and boat equipment, \$241,566; ordnance materials, \$14,294; and fuel, \$20,568." The appraisal was called for as evidence in the suit for the award of prize money.
