Ordinance No. 25 to amend ordinance No. 2 read the second time. Motion made and supported it be adapted. Carried. Bills read and referred to finance committee. Bill of Mr. Clark read. Motion made and supported it be allowed and warrant issued for same. Carried. Motion made and supported to adjourn to Saturday, Feb. 10, 7:30 P. M. Carried.

Ordinance No. 25. An ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 2 of the City of Wasco entitled "An Ordinance defining the duties of and fixing the compensation of the recorder of the City of Wasco, and regulating the proceedings in the recorder's court."

Be it ordained by the common council of the City of Wasco: SECTION 1. That section 3 of said Ordinance No. 2 of the City of Wasco entitled "An ordinance defining the duties of and fixing the compensation of the recorder of the City of Wasco, and regulating the proceedings in the recorder's court," be amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 3. The recorder shall receive as compensation for his services as recorder, auditor and clerk of the common council, the sum of fifty dollars per year; he shall also receive while acting as a justice of the peace, from Sherman county or the parties to the action, the same fees as are allowed by law to justices of the peace for the same services; Provided, that he shall receive no fees or compensation from the City of Wasco for such services; he shall also receive such fees as are or may be allowed by the ordinances of the city for various services and also for every trial in his court for the violation of a city ordinance and conviction upon a plea of guilty, fifty cents; for every such trial by the court where the charge shall be contested, and a defense made and judgment rendered therein, whether of conviction or acquittal, one dollar; and for every such trial where a jury shall be called and a verdict and judgment rendered therein, two dollars.

The fees and compensation herein provided shall be payable quarterly upon the submission and approval of the recorder's report, by warrant duly drawn therefor in the same manner as other claims are paid. Passed Feb. 5, 1900. Approved this 7th day of February, 1900.

Bees Notes. Honey is Nature's offering to man—ready for use, abounding in blessings, and free from injurious effects. It should cease to be a luxury, and, especially where there are children, should become as common as sugar. Much better is it to use honey—though more expensive—than hurtful adulterations of glucose, chemical jellies, etc. The system demands sweets, and no other is so easily assimilated or so quick to manifest its beneficial effects as honey.

Few subjects are more fascinating than bees, few products more delectable than honey. A taste of the latter inspires an interest in the former; a knowledge of the former gives a special relish to its product. In the chalice of the flower Nature secretes a drop of nectar; to get it the bee pushes past stamen and pistil. In so doing he becomes covered with pollen, which is mixed with that of the next flower, and thus the ovum becomes fertilized and fruit is produced. Some plants depend entirely on insects to carry and mix their pollen. Every bee-keeper should encourage horticulture, and every fruit-raiser should welcome the apiarist as his best neighbor.

Bees never injure sound fruit. Hornets and other insects do, however, and then the bees suck out the juice which would otherwise be wasted. A bunch of sound grapes may be hung in the center of a hive of bees and left for days without injury.—Farm Journal.

A Careless Visitor. Last week a family by the name of Pool from Moro visited Mr. Mullican's family just outside the city limits in the East End, and one of the family, a young man, was just recovering from an attack of smallpox. The city authorities learned of his presence Friday evening and employed Dr. Doane to make an examination. He visited Pool at the home of Mr. Mullican and found that he had not yet passed the stage where the disease might be transmitted to others, although the doctors at Moro had permitted him to leave his home. There were still scabs on his face and body. Unfortunately Pool had been down town trading at various stores and came in contact with a great many people, and there is no telling what the result may be.

Mr. Mullican's house has been quarantined and the entire family vaccinated, and therefore should they take down with smallpox there is little likelihood of its spreading from that source, nevertheless strict precaution should be observed, and everybody who has not been vaccinated should be.

Not Scared at Sumpter. It would seem that Sumpter does not think it is smallpox, like Moro, according to a correspondent of the

Telegram. In an article in Monday's edition the writer says: If there is any smallpox here no one seems to know it; certainly none pay any attention to it. The hotels and streets are crowded as much as ever, and everybody attends to his business with blissful disregard of the alarming rumors.

The fact of the matter is that there is some kind of an eruptive disease prevalent here, but there is not a physician in Sumpter who is willing to stake his reputation on the declaration that it is smallpox. It is a disease that is perhaps a little worse than chickenpox, but nowhere near as bad as smallpox. There are a few cases now in the pesthouse. There are several more among the homes of Sumpter, and there are some afflicted with the disease to be seen even upon the streets. No one having it goes to bed, unless he has to. It is confined principally to miners, who either from choice or necessity have not observed the laws of health in reference to cleanliness. Not a woman or child in Sumpter has had it. Not a death from it has yet occurred anywhere in this vicinity. This is the exact situation in reference to the alleged smallpox epidemic here.

In Baker City the situation is much the same. The same disease is prevalent there and in the same mild form.

Ordinance No. 24. An ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 4 of the City of Wasco entitled "An ordinance prescribing the duties of and fixing the compensation of the marshal of the City of Wasco."

Be it ordained by the common council of the City of Wasco: SECTION 1. That section 3 of said ordinance be amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 3. The marshal shall receive as compensation for his services a salary of one hundred and twenty dollars per year; he shall also receive for each arrest made for the violation of a city ordinance that shall result in the conviction of the person arrested, one dollar; and for attendance upon the recorder's court and the service of all papers and process in such case, provided the same shall be contested and a conviction had other than upon a plea of guilty, fifty cents; he shall also receive such other fees as are now or may hereafter be provided by the ordinances of said city.

In addition to the fees and compensation above mentioned, he shall while acting as constable receive from Sherman county or the parties to the action, the same fees allowed by law to constables in justices' courts for like services, but he shall receive no compensation for such services from the City of Wasco.

All compensation except that received from the parties to the action or from the county, shall be payable quarterly upon warrant duly drawn therefor and the submission and approval of his quarterly report. Passed Feb. 5, 1900. Approved this 7th day of February, 1900.

The Dalles' Future. President Hugh Glenn of the "Regulator" line has but little faith in the proposed line from Lyle. He says The Dalles people are going to give \$50,000 to the portage road for the purpose of building a bridge at the narrows so that The Dalles will be the terminus. Also that The Dalles will build a railroad south from that point in the near future; and better still, that one of the richest coal mines in the world is situated adjoin The Dalles. A woolen and scouring mill would have been in operation long ago if some of the warehouse owners were not opposed to any such improvement, as it might injure their business. If a road is ever built to Goldendale, it is Mr. Glenn's opinion that it will start from The Dalles and come through the Columbia gap.

The Dalles may amount to something some day but she never will so long as these improvements are made only on paper. Perhaps Goldendale will never get a railroad, but if grading work does not commence within the next sixty days, President Lytle will have done some very tall lying. It has only been a few days since he informed one of our business men that he expected to be over here by April 1st with the entire crew which is now working on the extension to Shaniko.—Goldendale Sentinel.
