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Supreme Court Decisions.

Last week the supreme court made six decisions, the gist of which follows:

An instrument once a mortgagee always a mortgagee, and the parties cannot divest it of its character and treat it as a deed, so as to convey title, by any subsequent verbal understanding or agreement.

It is the duty of a master to give an unskilled servant warning when exposing him to a dangerous service and to instruct him how to avoid injury.

A dedication of roads made by entering a plat thereof in the county records will be presumed to be a dedication for the general public, unless otherwise shown, and this applies where land in the country has been cut up into small tracts and sold, as well as where city property has been cut up into lots and blocks.

When a milling company has purchased grain stored with a warehouseman, and there has been a shortage in the amount of grain owned by depositors in the warehouse, the depositors may recover from the milling company. They may do so even though the company thought believing that the warehouseman had authority to sell.

All the parties in interest in a controversy should be made parties to the suit, either as plaintiffs or defendants, and where it is possible to make them parties a few will not be allowed to sue in behalf of all.

A sheriff's return on a writ of attachment is not invalid where it shows that a copy of the writ was delivered to the occupant of the real property who was a Chinese whose name was not known to the sheriff.

ADMIRAL SAMPSON DEAD.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Admiral Sampson today had a violent hemorrhage. His condition is critical. At 2 o'clock this afternoon Admiral Sampson was unconscious and breathing laboriously. His physicians state that he is failing rapidly, and that the end may come at any moment. For several days past the Admiral has been growing weaker, and the hemorrhage this morning brought on the sinking spell.

The hemorrhage from which Admiral Sampson suffered this morning was from the brain. At this hour (2:45 P. M.) his unconsciousness is very profound.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Admiral Sampson died at 5 o'clock this afternoon.—Telegram.

Rules, Regulations and By-Laws of the Farmers and Mechanics Club of Wasco, Oregon.

The trustees of the above named club present the following rules and regulations for the government of the club:

1. All persons are requested to refrain from all profane, or immoral language, while in attendance at the club.
2. No Liquors or intoxicating drinks will be allowed in the room.
3. Ladies are admitted to the club, free of charge.
4. No member will be allowed to bring more than one gentleman friend, and that not to exceed one night in each week.
5. No member or members, shall be allowed to play more than one game on tables or alleys while others are waiting to use the same.
6. There will be no dogs or domestic animals allowed in the club room at any time.
7. The President, Secretary and Treasurer shall have the right to admit any one they may see fit, who is of good moral character, and twenty-one years old, who desires to look at club room, with object of joining same.
8. The President, Secretary and Treasurer shall constitute a board of arbitration, who shall settle all disputes or arguments, such decisions shall be final.
9. The club hours shall be governed by the board of trustees.
10. The Board of trustees and officers shall have their office in a room out of the club room. No member will be permitted, except by permission of some of the above officers.
11. Any party or parties, who shall be caught or found gambling in any way, shape or form, shall be subject to a ten dollar fine, or exclusion from the club, or both.

Constitution of "The Farmers and Mechanics Club" of Wasco, Sherman County, Oregon.

ARTICLE I.
 This Club shall be known as "The Farmers and Mechanics Club."

ARTICLE II.
 OFFICERS.
 The Officers of this Club shall be a President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall hold office during good behavior, or while they are residents of Sherman County, Oregon, or until removed by act of the lodge, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

No one shall be an officer of this Club who is not in good standing and a resident of Sherman County, Oregon.

Any officer may be removed from office upon the complaint of two members in good standing which complaint shall be approved by a majority vote of all members present at a business meeting and voting.

If for any reason an officer of the Club is not present at a business meeting of the Club, unless the reason for such absence is such as to disqualify him from holding such office, then any member of the Club may be appointed by a majority of those present to act as an officer pro tem.

The President, Secretary and Treasurer shall constitute a Board of Trustees, who shall have full and exclusive charge of all ordinary business of the Club, and shall have full and absolute control of the Club rooms and all property belonging to or in the possession of the Club, for the care and protection of the same; provided nothing herein shall be so construed as to permit said trustees to dispose of any property of the Club or contract any indebtedness without the consent of the Club given in a regularly called business meeting.

ARTICLE III.
 MEMBERSHIP.
 All persons over twenty-one years old of good moral character, upon the recommendation of two members in good standing, and the payment of one week's dues, shall be admitted to full membership in this Club. But no member not in good standing shall be admitted to the Club room, until he has paid all arrearages.

ARTICLE IV.
 BUSINESS MEETINGS.
 A meeting for the transaction of business may be called at the discretion of the President when it shall, in his judgment, be necessary for the transaction of such business.

ARTICLE V.
 DUES.
 Each member of this Club shall pay to the Treasurer as dues a fee of Twenty-five cents each week, which dues shall be due and payable on Saturday of each week; provided that when a candidate shall be admitted on any other day of the week he shall not be exempt from the payment of such dues, but shall pay like dues as if he had been admitted on the day when such dues are regularly due.

ARTICLE VI.
 REGULATIONS.
 This Club shall be subject to such regulations as the trustees may from time to time formulate for its guidance and for the guidance of its members, both in social and business meetings; and the objects of this Club being the mental, social and physical culture of its members, no gambling or profane, vulgar or ungentlemanly conduct or language shall at any time be permitted in the Club rooms. Any violation of this provision shall be cause for immediate expulsion. But no liquor shall be allowed in the Club room. "Roberts Rules of Order" shall be the authority on Parliamentary Law in all business meetings of this Club.

ARTICLE VII.
 AMENDMENT.
 This constitution may be amended upon the application of two members in good standing, and approved by a majority vote of all the members present and voting; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote in any business meeting who is not in good standing; and provided further that upon such application of two members, the President shall at once call a business meeting of the club to be held on the next succeeding Saturday, and provided further that no member shall be considered in good standing who has not fully paid all fees due the club, and provided that five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE VIII.
 ADOPTION.
 The constitution shall be adopted when it shall have been signed by a majority of all the members of this Club, and all persons hereafter becoming members of this club shall sign this constitution before he shall be admitted to membership in this Club.

ARTICLE IX.
 ELECTIONS.
 All officers shall be elected by a majority vote of all members in good standing and voting, but no election of officers shall be held except in a regular business meeting of the Club.

PULLMAN ORDINARY SLEEPERS.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years.

To meet this demand, the Pullman Company has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers, being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance.

They are equipped with mattresses, towels, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, blankets, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing to be taken up by the passenger.

Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light house keeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table.

A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers.

In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change.

Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Chicago.

Much of the first-class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
