LAND OF WHEAT FIELDS.

Sherman County, Which was a Wilderness but Yesterday.

Following is a full and comprehensive write-up of Sherman county, by M. Fitzmaurice, correspondent of the "News" from Moro, which appeared in the New Year's Oregonian:

Sherman county comprises about 825 square miles of rolling prairie, advantageously situated between the Des Chutes and John Day rivers, and is one of the great grain-raising counties of the famous wheat belt of Eastern Oregon.

The soil consists, on the plateau land, of disintegrated volcanic ash containing all those properties essential to the growth of cereals. Along the river bottoms a rich sandy loam is to be found, which produces large crops of vegetables fruit, and alfalfa.

The climate is dry and bracing, with a moderate rainfall, sufficient for the growth of crops. There are no very marked extremes of heat or cold, and the dreaded blizzard and cyclone of the middle west are unknown. The winters are not severe, as stock of all kinds can be wintered out. During the summer the heat is not oppressive, and the west wind blowing over the snow-capped Cascade Mountains insures cool nights, during which the most restless can sleep. There are no mosquitos, or other pests of that kind. In the fall the weather is ideal—calm and bright. Malaria is unknown, and persons affected soon get well, while those suffering from pulmonary diseases find prompt relief.

WHEAT THE STAPLE PRODUCT.

Sherman county produces all the hardy crops—wheat, rye, barley, etc. Wheat, however, is the staple product, and to it Sherman county owes her prosperity. Last year, which was by no means a good season, there were 210,000 acres under wheat, the aggregate yield from which was 2,350,000 bushels, worth last October 70 cents per bushel, representing \$1,645,000—a very fair income for a county that twelve or fifteen years ago was an uncultivated and unfenced tract of waving bunch grass. The yield of wheat is steadily increasing, as new land is brought under the plow, and better methods of farming resorted to.

Besides the cereals, potatoes and vegetables of every variety can be raised in abundance. Alfalfa thrives on the river bottoms, where three or four crops are taken off each season, and it has been proven that one or two crops can be raised without irrigation on the uplands.

Summer fallow is the best method of wheat farming. Many farmers find that is a good plan to take off a spring crop after summer fallow, for then they get two crops in three years. The farms are large, seldom less than 320 acres, and as large as 3000 acres, consequently, farm operations are conducted on a large scale and with the most approved labor-saving machinery. During harvest labor is at a premium, farm hands getting from \$2 to \$5 per day. It is wonderful what a short time it takes a well-regulated outfit to harvest 1000 acres. Twenty-eight new combines, worth \$2,000 each, were bought by Sherman county farmers last season.

Peaches, apples, cherries, plums, apricots and all fruits, except citrus, can be raised to perfection. There are some large orchards on the Columbia river that ship great quantities of fruit East each year. Almost every farmer raises enough fruit for his own consumption and to spare.

ALL KINDS OF LIVESTOCK.

Horses, cattle, sheep and hogs all do well. Young stock runs at large on the Government range during open weather and are turned in to the straw stacks, left on the grain fields, when there happens to be snow on the ground.

Fowls of all kinds do remarkably well, and every farmer has his flock of chickens, turkeys, etc., and finds a ready sale for his surplus.

RAILROADS IN TWO DIRECTIONS.

The Columbia Southern railway traverses the length of the county from north to south, while the Ore-

gon Railway & Navigation Company's line forms the northern boundary. The longest haul by wagon to either of these lines does not exceed ten miles, and there is an excellent system of county roads.

Moro is the county seat, situated on the Columbia Southern railroad about the center of the county. It has a population of 600, and is an up-to-date town in every sense of the word, with a sewer system, electric lights, waterworks, three churches, and a fine court house free from debt. Grass Valley, ten miles south of Moro, is also up-to-date, with several brick buildings and a \$10,000 brick schoolhouse. Wasco, about the same distance north of the county seat, rivals Moro in size, buildings and business enterprise.

The county has six banks and the tax roll for 1902 amounted to nearly \$40,000, all of which has been paid. The county is free from debt and every warrant is worth its face value.

OPENINGS FOR IMMIGRANTS.

Men of large capital can find a wide field for operations. There are manufactures, and the water power on the John Day and DesChutes is going to waste. Men of small capital cannot do better than buy a wheat farm. Prices of land are ridiculously low, good land going at from \$10 to \$20 an acre, land just as good as that of older counties sells for \$40 to \$50. Farmers that have purchased land in this county have done remarkably well, and we challenge any locality of equal size in the United States for as many men who carry check books, with money behind them in the bank, as our Sherman county wheatraisers. Labor of all kinds finds a fair remuneration and farm hands are at a premium during harvest. Women and girls to do housework can scarcely be found at all and can earn from \$4 to \$4.50 per week.
