Pioneering in Sherman County

Some Interesting History of the Early Days
By George L. Doyle.
(All Rights Reserved.)

I will remember the last trip I made to Pine Hollow for wood in the fall of 1882. It was about the first of November and most of my friends advised me not to risk a trip, as it was too late in the season; but as I did not think I had enough wood to last over till spring I concluded to take my chances, and started alone. As the days were short I did not make the regular camp but fell short several miles. As I prepared camp for the night I noticed that indications pointed to a change in the weather, which was already, extremely cold (especially for an "orange blossom"). After seeing that everything was all right I rolled myself in the blankets, and, being tired, was soon asleep. It was about four o'clock next morning that I was awakened by the intense cold, and discovered that there was a white blanket of snow covering me to the depth of four inches, and still snowing. As I could not better my condition I lay till daylight, and when I got up I found that it had stopped snowing but there was fully six inches of snow on the ground.

Now came the rub, to do or not to do; to turn back might cause me to be laughed at, and to go on might be a waste of time. While considering the matter I came to the conclusion to leave it to the weather, viz: if the sun rose clear I would continue, if not, I would turn back. Old Sol seemed to know that I needed the wood for he came up over the eastern hills in all his glory, in a perfectly clear sky. Of all the beautiful sights, I consider a sunrise on the prairie one of the grandest, with its unobstructed view of miles of landscape, with its snow-capped peaks showing clearly in that pure and rarefied air; and I do believe there is not a spot in the world that shows such a panoramic view of snow-capped peaks to such an advantage as can be seen from a high rise on the old ridge road, leading south toward Jackknife.

But to continue: indications pointing for good weather, I hitched my donkeys and started for Pine Hollow. Reaching there I chopped and loaded a good full cord and a quarter of wood. In the meantime the sun had melted the snow, leaving only slush and mud. When I had finished loading it was too late to move, so I took the stock to water and fixed up for the night. Next morning I started early, and late next night I got to McDonald's spring—a good trip, considering the condition of the roads. Arrived home next day about ten o'clock, considerably the worse for the trip, having contracted a very bad cold.

After a few days' rest I concluded that I needed some chickens, which were scarce in the neighborhood. As two of my friends were in need of the same articles, I went over to Goldendale and got five or six dozen. I made the trip and arrived safe home with my load of fowls. It must have been four, possibly six, days after getting home, if my memory serves me right, that the winter of 1882-3 began. Not being accustomed to cold weather, all I could do was to chop and burn wood. I would rush out and chop an armful of wood, and rush back into the house and burn it all to get reasonably warm again, so it was a great deal like the Irishman's pig: he put the pig in the pen; one day he fed it all it would eat, the next day he starved it. A friend asked him why he did that for. Pat said he "wanted his pork to have a streak of lean and a streak of fat."
