Western Alaska is too close to the Arctic circle for very long summers, but the days are so long and warm that cereals and grasses are said to mature much quicker than in latitudes farther south. Farming may never become an industry of very great importance in Alaska, but as the country develops on other lines, there will be a demand for agricultural products which may make their culture even under adverse circumstances quite profitable.—Oregonian.
