## IN FLORIDA.

### Former Oregon Man Writes of Customs in the South.

Pensacola, Fla., July 6, 1934.  
To The News, Wasco, Oregon.

Since coming to Florida, and Pensacola, I have seen and learned much of interest to a Westerner. Every different section of the country has some laws, customs and rules different from every other section. So Florida has her share of these peculiarities. A few I shall now try to mention briefly for the edification of The News readers, together with my conclusions and observations of the country as I see it.

In the first place I find Southern Georgia and Florida about the same in topography, altitude and productiveness. The country is low and flat, and consists for the most part of white, sandy pine flats. The timber is very inferior in size and quality. You will seldom see a tree exceeding two feet in diameter, and from that down to the size of fence poles. The entire country is dotted over with small, "one horse" saw mills, turpentine camps and phosphorus mines, the latter consisting of a phosphate stone which is ground and used for fertilizers, etc. In extracting the resin from the pine, a small hole, or box, is cut into the tree on two or three sides to catch the resin; the bark being taken off for about four feet above, the resin runs into the hole or box and from this into small buckets attached, holding half a gallon. The employees of the distilleries come around every few days, empty the buckets into barrels and haul off to the various camp distilleries scattered through the country where it is made into turpentine in the form used for medical purposes, and shipped to all parts of the world. In this, as in all other industries, a few men have grown immensely wealthy and have built up large monopolies, and, as little as may be thought of it, the turpentine industry of Alabama, Georgia and Florida constitutes a large commercial commodity, and gives employment to thousands of hands, mostly Negroes. The agricultural interests in Florida cuts but little figure north of Tampa and Jacksonville. South of these points I have not been, but it is below these points that the orange and pineapple flourish.

This state having been originally settled by the Spaniards, there are many interesting landmarks and relics of this once dominant race, whose religious tendencies and barbarities have caused her once boasted civilization to wane and crumble almost into dust. There are old tombs in the
