One of the longest race meeting ever attempted in Oregon will open in Portland on August 8 and continue to August 28, and possibly through the first two weeks in September. A large force of workmen are rushing the work of getting Irvington race track in shape for the coming meet. Already trainers and owners are shipping their strings to the track, and the officers of the Multnomah Fair Association are preparing to stable 500 horses, the pick of those now racing at Seattle.
In the matter of fire protection for this city the council has ordered a single track chemical engine, with double cylinders, and 150 feet of hose. The engine has been telegraphed for and will arrive in a few days. The outfit will cost the city \$700 and freight added from Portland. After the engine arrives and is given a satisfactory test, to the satisfaction of the council, the payment will be as follows: \$500 cash, the remaining \$200 to be paid in six months. The two cylinder engine was ordered on account of being able to furnish a steady stream, or, while one tank was in use, the other could be refilled.—Grass Valley Journal.
