Estimated Twenty Bushels or More.

The estimate of the probable yield of grain on the Military Road Land from Nigger Ridge north was finished yesterday. Roughly speaking the crop in that district will average twenty bushels to the acre and may go better if the weather does not turn to hot east winds and "pinch" some of the later sown spring grain. There are not many crops of fall wheat north of Gordon Ridge but spring sown grain on summerfallow, and in fact all the spring grain looks very well. As we said before there are some backward spring crops that may shrivel if the east winds prevail and come hot. There is a certain amount of moisture still in the ground that may counteract these conditions, and pull these few late crops through anyhow. Most of the spring grain is made, and cannot be injured, whatever happens. Fall grain is of course splendid, except where the summerfallow wasn't taken care of and these sure enough weeds are more plentiful than wheat. We had a nice supper and spent the night with Walter Morehouse and nearly got a fit when we heard a telephone ring viciously at our elbow. It seems that all these fellows down there have telephones in their houses, and can call one another up, and converse with Wasco, and the outer world just the same as us town folks. We heard one lady call her husband who was at a neighbor's and say that "the cows were in the grain and to come home at once," and curious enough she didn't yell and wave her arms over her head, in the old fashioned way. Ed McMillan and the Kasebergs have some summerfallow for next year that is a credit to them, worked down like a garden and no weeds to be seen, quite a contrast to some we have seen, clods and lumps with beautiful bunches of Fire weed in between. Where all the crops are good and nearly alike it is hard to discriminate, but we think Dan Morehouse has one of the best. His land was not in very good condition last fall, but he had the sense to use a weeder and sow his grain in the spring, and the result is something like eleven or twelve sacks of grain to the acre.

Bill Walker who was hit pretty hard last year, has a fine spring crop on the section he has from the company, besides some hundreds of acres on his own land, all his wheat should average close to ten sacks with favorable weather. Lyle Barnett commenced to head a good crop of blue stem, on Tuesday. Harvest operations are only just commencing. Walker Bros. gave their big Holts combine a preliminary canter round the hog pasture on Tuesday, it was going at the rate of about a mile a month when we saw it, with many stops, to fix a bolt here and there. She'll go alright later on.

Marsh as Bunko Man.
When druggist Joe Marsh of Wasco, Sherman county, arrived in Portland to have an outing with his friends he met an old acquaintance, whom he had not seen for a long time. The first thing they did was to repair to a thirst exterminator conducted by the druggist's nephew on one of the business streets. While chatting at the bar a stranger stepped up to the man from Wasco and, displaying a star, urged the gentleman and his friend to walk down to Second and Oak streets for an interview with C. H. Hunt. Arriving at the police station, Mr. Marsh was questioned as to his occupation, habits of life and his immediate financial resources. He explained his business and good conduct, displayed a couple of hundred dollars and then inquired of the clerk what he was taken for or charged with. He was informed that he very much resembled a life-sized portrait of a bunko man. Just at this moment Joe Day, an old friend, stepped into the station, and Marsh's liberty was saved. He says he does not know what he might have confessed to had he been further plied with questions, and that it is likely nothing short of murder or at least highway robbery would have been lodged against him had Day not appeared just when he did.—Oregon Journal.
