How to Cook Prunes.

When prunes are served they should fall apart from the stones and be very tender. In order that the prunes should reach the perfection of tenderness it is better to soak them in cold water for twenty four hours before cooking. First they should be washed thoroughly in scalding water, then put to soak. After the soaking they may be boiled with sugar, not too much, or they may be soaked a second twenty-four hours in milk and then served with honey. Honey is always better with cream than sugar is.

How to Give Castor Oil.

Pour a little hot milk into a wine-glass, then pour the oil into the center of the milk and carefully pour a little more milk on top. If the whole is drunk without stopping, the oil will not be tasted at all.

How to Meet Strange Dogs.

If a strange dog chances to cross your path speak kindly to him instead of using the boot. The magic power of the voice may save you from a bite. And never shrink from a dog that jumps toward you. That would be an exhibition of fear that he is apt to take advantage of. Stand on your ground, greet him kindly and, above all things, never run away from him.

How to Make Mock Sausage.

Soak dry bread in water. Take as much cold meat, chopped fine, as you have bread, mix and season with salt, pepper and sage. Make into small cakes and fry.

How to Make Good Wine Sauce.

An excellent wine sauce calls for one cup of butter, creamed with two cups of sugar. Add gradually half a cup of hot madeira or sherry, and place the sauce in a bowl set in a basin of hot water, and stir for two minutes or until it is perfectly smooth and foamy. Serve it hot in a boat beside the pudding.

How to Clean Tins.

Whiting mixed in a paste with sweet oil removes all spots from tin. Polish afterward with dry whiting and newspapers.

Newberg to the Front.

How to Make Tomato Toast.

Cook together two cupfuls of canned tomatoes and two small onions chopped fine for three-quarters of an hour; season with salt and pepper, add two level tablespoonfuls of butter and one-half cupful of milk. Pour over slices of toasted bread.

Slice the onions as thin as possible, salt and place between slices of bread and butter. A bit of parsley helps to take away the odor from the breath.

How to Soften Blacking.

When blacking has become hard in the cake through long keeping, if a little water is poured over it and placed in a warm oven for ten minutes it will mix quite easily.

How to Make a White Gown Smart.

A white gown may be made very smart with a trimming of orchids, which is expensive to buy, but easy to make if one can embroider. These flowers and leaves are appliqued. They look especially beautiful on gold and silver cloth.

How to Make a Good Gargle.

A simple remedy for hoarseness and tickling in the throat is the gargle of the white of an egg beaten to a froth in half a glass of warm, sweetened water.

How to Thicken the Eyebrows.

As we go to press the prospects of serious international complications arising from the passage of the Dardanelles, in violation of treaty rights, of the Russian Black Sea fleet, are rapidly increasing.
