## Rye Specimens Wanted.

The Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition Commission have sent a request to the Columbia Southern Ry. Co., to get as many specimens or samples of rye, grown in Sherman, as possible. The various station agents on this line are authorized to receive such specimens, and to ship to headquarters. These samples are intended to be shipped to the Oregon building at the World's Fair in St. Louis, to help complete Oregon's agricultural exhibits.

All farmers in this county should take a little time off and collect some nice specimens of rye for this worthy purpose, so as to show strangers what Eastern Oregon is capable of. All samples should be only of the best, so they will be worthy of Sherman county, and each separate bunch should have a card attached showing where the grain was grown, by whom, and any other fact that would be of advantage to this locality. Give your specimens to your nearest station agent, and he will see that they are properly taken care of.

Although this county does not raise so very much rye, what is grown is usually of the best; and as other Oregon counties are gathering extensive exhibits for the Fair, Sherman should not be left out just for want of sending exhibits in. We can make as fine a showing as any locality, and we should do it. Now, all together, and let's show that old Sherman is again to the front as usual.

## Harvester Overturned.
