SOCIALISM A FACTOR FOR PROGRESS

The marvelous development of socialism in European countries has of late years been a source of considerable unrest among the governing classes; in Germany where the recent meetings caused the government such uneasiness they have become one of the chief political parties having cast in 1898 over 2,000,000 votes, their objects are substantially the same as in this country but under the oppressive military government they have found a more fertile soil for the propagation of their faith, while their leadership is of a considerably higher grade than in this country. Socialism in no country has been successful so far as control of offices are concerned but has in all parts of the world been a force that has made itself felt in many ways. The Initiative and Referendum laws and the secret ballot have had their first champions in the socialist party. Its objects are too radical to become effectively popular with the masses. It is never the less a fact that from agitation by extremists has come some of the most useful and popular reforms of modern society. Viewed in this light, Socialism is of extreme value to mankind, and in Europe it will yet be the prime force that will strike the death blow to the fiction of Divine right of Kings and the ultimate overthrow of hereditary rulers, with this will go burdensome armaments of Europe. Socialism is faulty in that it is ahead of the times, but like other outbreaks of idealists it indirectly accomplishes a valuable work.

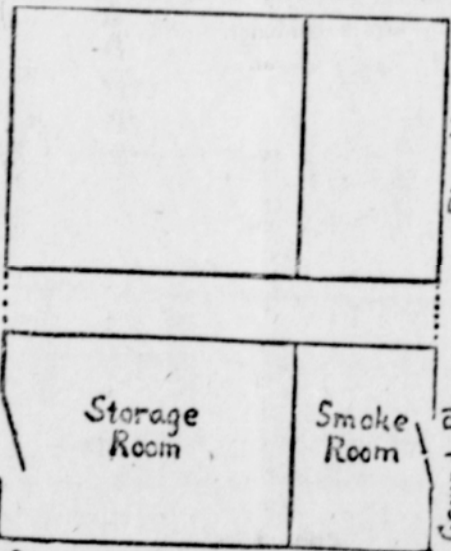

A SMOKEHOUSE PLAN.

Provides Smoke and Storage Rooms and Handy Fittings.

A plan for a convenient smokehouse for one who does butchering in a small way is submitted in Orange Judd Farmer. The smoke room is boarded up tight so that a minimum of smoke

will do the work. Above this room under the roof there is always a place to store articles not often used.

The storage room is fitted up with shelves and hooks. The shelves are arranged around the sides of the room. Two notched boards are attached vertically to the wall at the end of each set of shelves. A board made to fit these notches extends from the one to the other, and on it rests the shelf. The advantage of such shelves is that they are not permanent. They can be arranged at any distance apart at pleas-

ure or can be removed entirely if desired to make room for something else. Hooks are put in the edges of heavy boards, and these are laid across the beams overhead. If the board is not to be permanently attached, be careful not to load one side only, or it will be overturned.
