The closing of the Oregon Trading Co's store in Wasco and the appointment of a receiver in behalf of the creditors and other interested parties, at the same time has caused a quaking in the boots of many of our inhabitants. They seem to think that because the O. T. Co. have had some bad luck that the whole town and community is going to the devil and that injunctions and receivers will be as thick as the hair on a dogs back.

It is true that in a sense this failure, which we have reason to believe is not a failure in the ordinary business sense, is for the simple reason that the firm is a big one a hard lick to the prestige of Wasco. But is this failure, if you must call a little carelessness and misunderstanding a failure, a result of weakness in Wasco as a business center? Wasco has been prosperous in the past and the same elements that have gone to make up that prosperity are still present, and while Wasco in common with other towns all over the interior and every town in Sherman county feels the effect of the tightness of the money market, and things are generally decidedly unpleasant still there is no reason on earth why a single other firm in Wasco should be compelled to close its doors even for the short time that the O. T. Co. will be closed. All over the interior there has been a stringency in the money supply ever since the fair which to a very large extent has been aggravated in parts by the Texas Sand Hill Craze.

All this will, however, be corrected with the harvest and marketing of another crop, which despite the freeze and large amount of reseeded necessary, will in all probability be good.

W. M. BARNETT GIVES SOME TIMELY ADVICE.

TO THE PATRONS OF THE WASCO NEWS:

We deem a letter from us to the people in this portion of Sherman county will not be out of the way at this time as we have had perhaps as much experience as any one in the county as to farming and business in general. We believe that the recent cold snap has in most cases killed the fall sown grain, and we deem it advisable that all persons should in the next two or three weeks examine their fields very carefully and be convinced that they have three-fourths of a stand of grain, or that the same should be reseeded.

We believe that the grain should not be rushed in the first thing for this reason that upon fallow land worms work much worse than they do upon winter or spring plowing, and if the ground is harrowed and the top kept mulched so as to retain the moisture and at the same time cultivated so as to not allow the weeds to grow, that seeding in May will bring excellent crops, and as we have an unusual amount of moisture we look for good crops this season, and we recommend seeding the winter or spring plowing before reseeded the fallow land.

As to the treatments of the wheat to prevent smut we feel that we want to say that we recommend the use of formaldehyde, as this is the only known treatment that is absolute destruction to the smut germ. Some have said it also kills wheat so that it will not germinate, this has been certainly a mistake or else it was not properly used, the Washington Agricultural College recommend one pound to fifty gallons of water and the Oregon College one pound to forty-eight gallons, and treat the wheat same as we do in treating it with bluestone, we feel that we have been greatly damaged the past three seasons by having to deal with wheat at our mill that has smut in it, and

we believe this can all be avoided by treating as we have recommended.

In a recent conversation with E. O. McCoy, he tells us that he guaranteed this treatment to one of his customers in Wasco county, who always had infected wheat and that he did enter into a contract to take his grain after he had so treated it as we have recommended before seeding as number one, and that said party did so treat his seed for last season's crop and that the wheat delivered to Mr. McCoy, some 6000 sack was absolutely free from smut, we could refer you to many other similar experiences.

We, last season received grain at our mill in Wasco that we were obliged to dock on account of smut \$6 per ton, and we were not anxious for it at the price, and in fact, do not care to have smutty grain at a large discount, so we advise thorough treatment of all grain, barley as well as wheat before seeding.

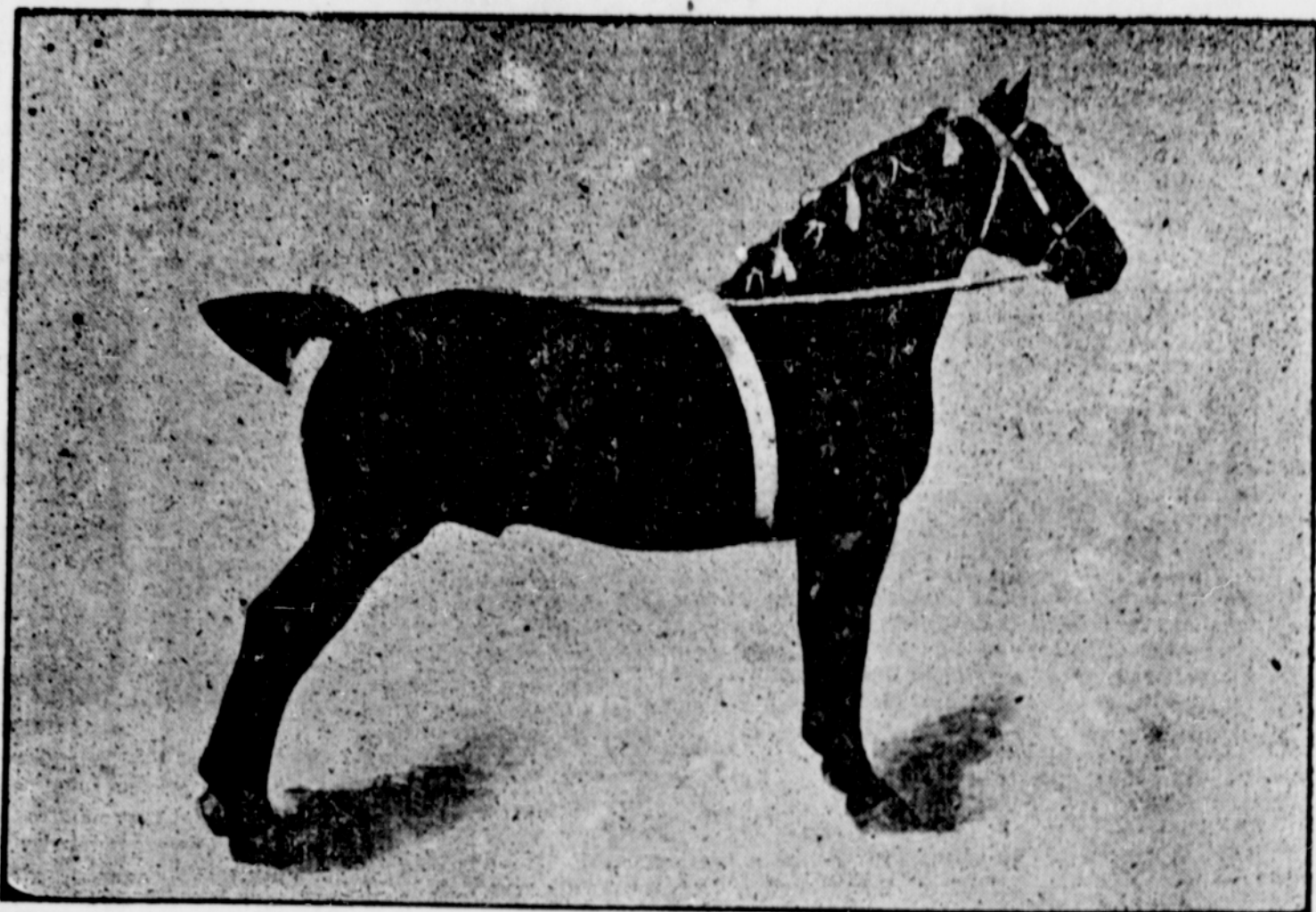
