ADDITIONAL WASCO LOCALS

Fourth of July has been celebrated in this for many years, especially at The Dalles. Here the citizens have always been very liberal in subscribing to a fund for this purpose.

The old style of celebrating the Fourth of July is well known to almost every citizen of this country, but this year The Dalles has undertaken a celebration that has not been equalled in the state of Oregon, and will, believe, excel any celebration ever given on the Pacific coast. The finance committee of five of the leading citizens of The Dalles has received subscriptions amounting to more than two thousand dollars, and this sum, with all incomes, will be used to make this a Fourth of July that will never be forgotten.

There will be a large number of special entertainments arranged for the visitors. Three bands have been engaged that will furnish excellent music.

The third day of July at ten o'clock the celebration will open with a band concert. This will be known as sales day, which has been fully explained in posters distributed over the county. There will be band concerts, races, ball games, and numerous other attractions given in the afternoon of the third, and in the evening a grand ball will be given in a large new building now being erected.

On the Fourth of July will be a street parade; there are now twenty floats entered for this parade. There will be a beautiful goddess of liberty float that cost originally one thousand dollars to build. There will also be a parade at eight-thirty in the evening, and grand ball with fire works.

This will undoubtedly be the largest Fourth of July celebration ever undertaken in this part of the state, and large number of visitors will be entertained by The Dalles in such a way that the third and Fourth of July 1906 will never be forgotten.

USEFUL HINT

A little milk added to the water in which potatoes are boiled will make them whiter and taste better.

The best way to clean bamboo furniture is to wash it well in warm water containing a gill of salt to each quart. This will preserve the color.

To clean a fishy frying pan, fill with cold water and place on the fire to boil. When boiling, put a red hot cinder in, and then wash in the usual way.

A teaspoonful of vinegar put into a paraffin lamp or stove that smells or smokes will cause it to burn with a clear light and prevent it from smoking.

Salt is an old-fashioned disinfectant, popular in our grandfather's day. It has the advantage of being nonodorous. It is capital for sprinkling about drains.

To remove the smell of paint, try hay sprinkled with a little chloride of lime. Left for an hour in a close room, it will remove the unpleasant smell of new paint.

Never lay fish one on top of the other but wring a cloth out of clean salted water, wrap them separately in this, and lay on a dish. Keep in the coolest place possible.

Shabby dark leather will look like new if rubbed with either linseed oil or the well-beaten white of an egg mixed with a little black ink. Polish with soft dusters until quite dry and glossy.

To polish mirrors, sponge with tepid water, to which a little spirits of wine has been added to remove dirt. Then polish with a soft cloth charged with powdered whiting. Finish with a silk handkerchief.

Cheese that is in danger of becoming too dry may be kept soft by wrapping it in a cloth wrung out in vinegar. It should be kept in a cool place. Many persons think the flavor of cheese is improved by this treatment.

If earthenware vessels have been burnt brown in cooking fruit or milk, or enamel pans or pie dishes are stained, or if silver spoon are stained with egg, or cups with tea, damp and rub them with a little common salt. By this simple method all stains will disappear.

Alcohol will clean soiled silk embroidery. Dip a camel's hair brush in it and brush the trimming till all the dirt is removed. Jet passementerie can be cleaned by rubbing it with a cloth dipped in equal parts of alcohol and water. Dry it afterward with a clean cloth.

Call For Bids For Painting School House Inside.

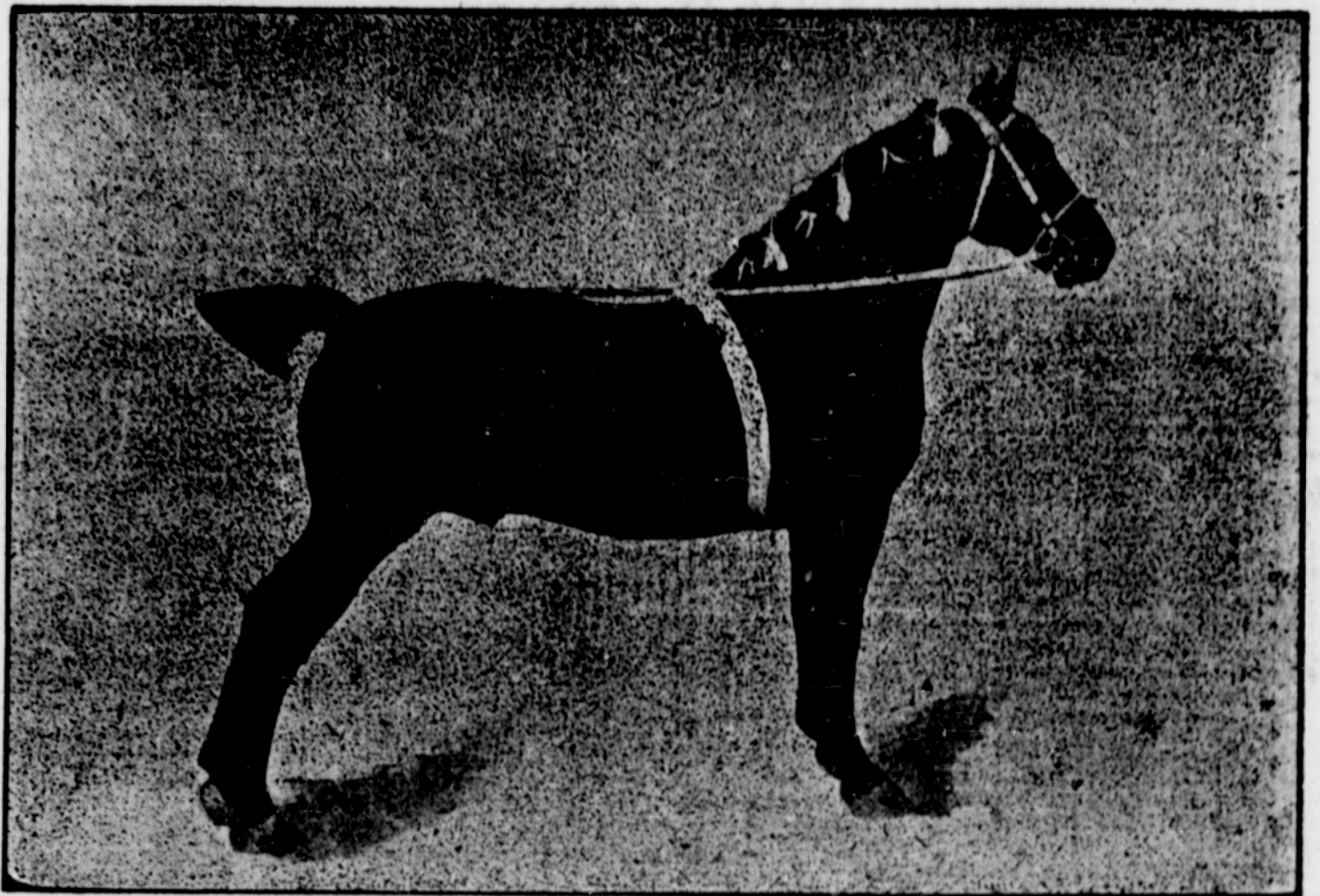

SHADOWS BEFORE.

If Bryan is nominated, as now seems probable, the Democratic Party will mean that it trusts the spirit more than it distrusts the letter; trusts his serflessness and devotion to the average man more than it distrusts an intellect which often goes astray after shallow remedies. Events have helped him more than he has helped himself, but he has not been without his share in bringing his party's opinion around in his direction. His support of the President was one estate and large-minded

decision, and his calm and judicious say on Socialism was another. The feeling of the country, however, that the railroads have partly triumphed in the Rate bill contest, and that the vested interests control the tariff, and that money generally is the ruling power, is what helps Bryan most. Next to that, perhaps, is the feeling of loyalty that is strong in humankind. His very defeats, in his campaigns, and especially in the banecon convention of 1904, have left him stronger with the Middle-west-

ern voters, who have always been the basis of his strength. Feeling that he has never had a fair opportunity, that he had more votes than McKinley in one election, that life insurance and other corporation money is now shown clearly to have been used in large sums to compass his defeat, and that the men who dominated the convention of 1904 were corporation servants as thorough as Aldrich himself, the Bryan following is looking eagerly for a contest on more even terms.—Collier's.
