Organization The Farmers Need.

In another column is a communication urging the farmer to organize, which we think is worth the while of every Sherman county farmer to read and carefully consider.

Nearly every other calling is to-day working under an organization which has for its object the benefit of the calling, labor, stockmen, manufactures, political parties, churches, schools, the men to whom the farmers sell their produce and from whom they buy, the grain dealers, mill men, sack dealers who are just now working the GRAFT for all it is worth, the railroads who have been grafting the Sherman county farmer ever since he has been known in general the whole line of trade and industry is organized except the farmer. All this works to the disadvantage of the people and the farmer in particular. The only way to meet and combat the unfavorable effect of the organization, which is coming to be a graft of the boldest sort, is to organize. The Farmer is the bone and sinew of this country and he is not getting his just proportion of it wealth. In Sherman county we have farmers of a very high order of intelligence who are capable of putting up an intelligent and consequently effective fight against the combinations opposed to them. The exorbitant rates charged by the railroads is clearly shown in the communication referred to, while the sack graft is put in a very bad light in view of the fact of the Walla Walla Penitentiary. Our farmers should get together. Just so long as you do not fight you will be at the mercy of men and combinations who are purposing to get all out of you that they can and so long as you do not pull together they will see to it that you do not get your just pay. Organize and take it.

The stockmen are going to have a big time at Moro. The Association seems to be putting its best foot forward and a successful meeting is likely. We hope the meeting will come up to the most sanguine expectations of its promoters. The farmers and county in general will profit by these meetings and the better they are attended the more benefit will be derived. Our farmers have worked too much as individuals in the past; they should get together. A good lively Grange would be useful affording as it does a complete and effective organization that has been found to work well in other places, and properly managed would be very useful in this county.

We hope we may have a warm pleasant day on the Fourth of July, & the people who come may enjoy the beautiful shade on the lawn in the park.

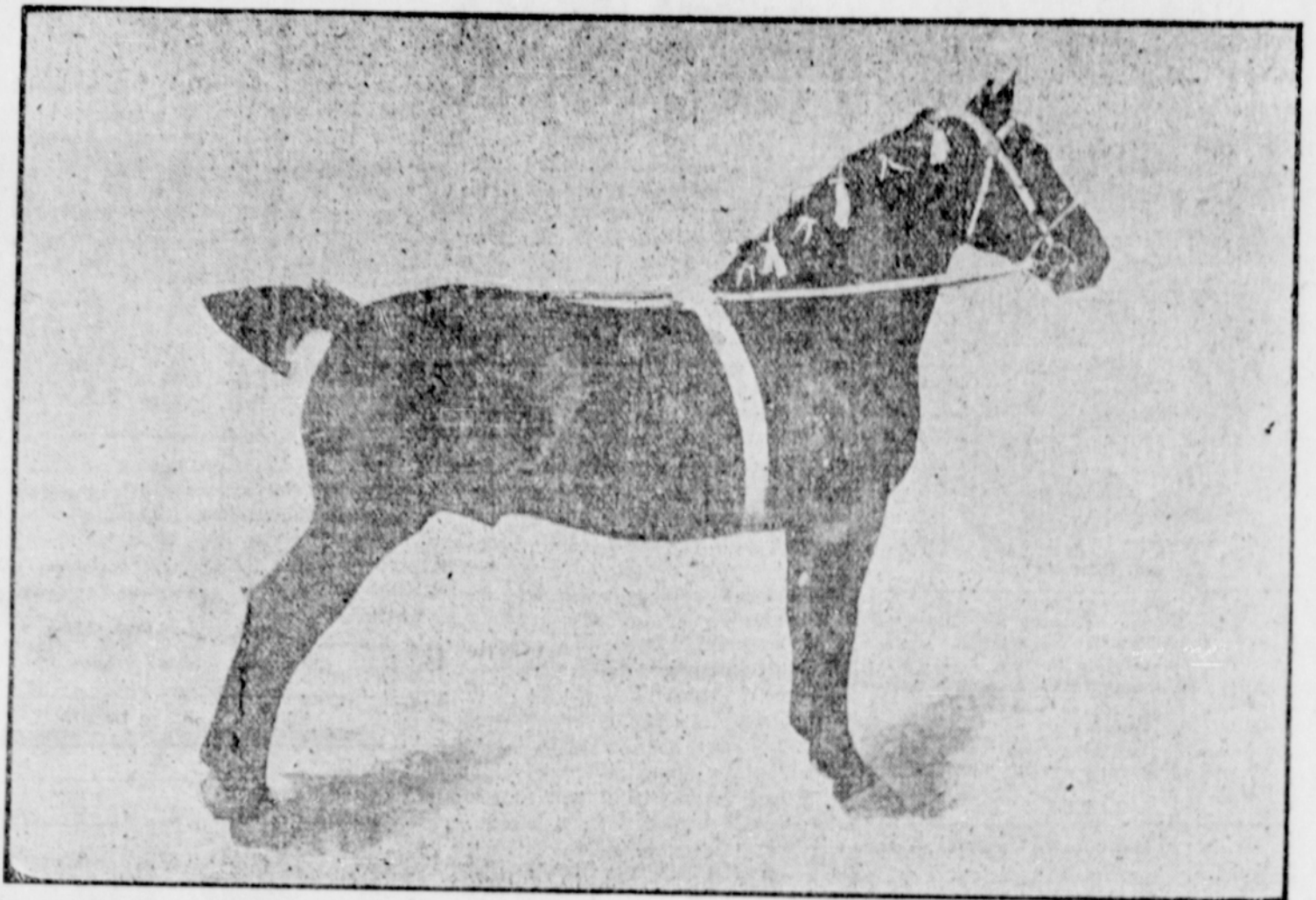
Synopsis of programme.
