Further they can an intelligent understanding of the subject, to the end that the works affecting the Northwest may be speedily completed, and it confidently relies upon the support of the entire Northwestern country in its efforts to bring about a condition which will result in such enormous and continuing benefits to all the people.

The Chairman then introduced Mr. Smith, who spoke of what great benefit an open river would be, to not only those adjacent to the river but also those living back further. He also said it was necessary to make this a permanent thing by patronizing the river to the end that we would have an open river for all time and thus make permanent any reduction which the railroads make at this or any future time.

Without this work is finished on the river, shippers will be at the mercy of the railroads and any reduction may only last till the wave for the open river lasts and then a rate perhaps higher than that at the present time may be put in force.

Mr. Parr spoke on relief from freight rates and thought the best way was to deliver grain to the river.

Mr. Barnett said he thought sacks could be obtained from the east at a lower rate than sacks were now selling for.

Several spoke on the advisability of working to the end that a plant be put in at the Salem Penitentiary for making sacks.

Letters read and filed as to the cost of a plant and the output and selling price of sacks made by the state.
