The Chicago Tribune of August 17th, has a special dispatch from Madison, Wis., in response to an inquiry from that paper as to how Wisconsin regards Speaker Cannon's Presidential boom. The rejoinder is to the effect that a "stand patter" on the tariff would not get thirty per cent of the Republican vote of that state. The report goes on to say that he is "old fashioned on the tariff," and that the people of Wisconsin want tariff revision and that this could not be expected from Cannon.

The Chicago Record-Herald of August 17th, says: Speaker Cannon's speech will be received by stand patters with great applause. It is likely to be cited by the stand patters of the East as proof that there is little Republican sentiment for revision in the West. But during the last three or four years there has been much evidence to the contrary, and the forces that have been so earnestly at work for revision and Reciprocity will hardly abandon the field because Speaker Cannon has spoken."

The Breeder's Gazette for August 8th, has a discussion of the relations of the stock feeders of the corn belt to the Continental European markets in the course of which it is clearly established that the only thing that stands in the way of an outlet for enormous numbers of cattle and other feed-lot products in these Continental markets is the failure or refusal of our own government to enter into fair reciprocal trade arrangements with Germany, France and neighboring nations. It is shown that we sold thirteen million dollars worth of live cattle to England and Belgium alone during the six months just ended; those nations being the only European countries admitting our live bullocks. If the French and German ports could be opened upon similar terms it is fair to assume that the Continental trade would take as much more to the manifest advantage of all producers. The Gazette says: "The complaint of the corn grower and the ranchman in this matter is that on account of our failure to provide some practical scheme of Reciprocity with Continental Europe, we have no fair chance to acquire the trade of some of the heaviest buyers of food products in the world."

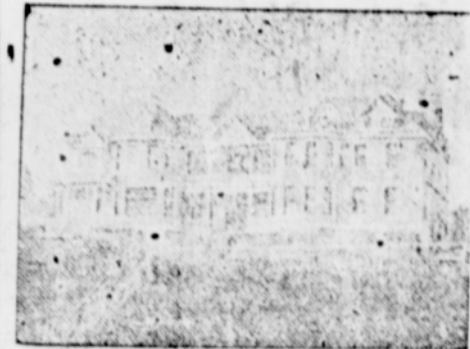
MORO LOCAL ITEMS

the lurch issued San Francisco insurance to several times the value of its American property rights. Hence the unfortunate and careless insurer, must content himself, at best, with perhaps one-third or one-fourth of his due, and that, probably, only after legal measures. To those British and American companies which have cheerfully accepted their full responsibility, declining to avail themselves of possible legal quibbles, all honor is due. And not honor alone, but the rightful profit of fair dealing. As a matter of business safety every prospective investor should know what companies have paid their just debts in San Francisco and patronize them them to the exclusion of those defaulting in whole or in part. The most effectual influence for betterment will be the establishing of the principle that unfair business is, in the long run, losing business.—Collier's.
