In another column will be found a communication from the Open River Transportation Co announcing the inauguration of their line of boats on the Columbia. The rates, a copy of which we have in our office, range from 17 1/2 cents to 37 1/2 cents per hundred at Rufus, Oregon, while some very reasonable rates are made on some articles such as fence posts and meats in carcass.

This company is deserving of the support of people in this section to the fullest possible extent. The exorbitant and unreasonable rates charged by the Herriman lines must be cut down if the state expects to obtain its full share of prosperity and the Columbia river is the most patent weapon at your command. The Open River people are offering the means of forcing better rates from the railroads and they should be supported.

The administration will probably not be in haste to interfere in the Cuban imbroglio. This nation is nevertheless under obligation to see to it that a stable government exists in Cuba. Had it not been for tacit promises to the world that we would exercise a guiding hand in Cuban affairs Cuban prosperity would not have been so pronounced as it has been since Cuba became a so called free state. Rail roads would not have been built, and its resources developed in numerous ways by foreign capital had that capital known that Cubans would have entire control. It is abundantly proven that capital is not safe in any Latin American state that enjoys the right to manage its affairs as it pleases nor does life and liberty enjoy a much better place. Cuban prosperity has been marvelous since the departure of the Spanish armies much more so than in any other Latin American state and this is chiefly due to the tacit promise of the American nation that we would see that all went well. We are under obligation to the Cubans to protect them from foreign aggression, and we have a right to demand of them that if they are no more capable of governing themselves than other Latin American states, then we will govern them.

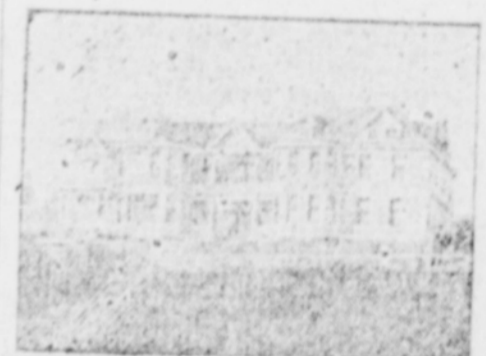
