The Ox Team Still on Hand.

Every now and then some one writes a solemn article to prove that the ox has had his day as a farm team, but he hasn't. Go to the town fairs at such places as Lyme and Hamburg, in Connecticut, or to the larger Danbury fair, and you will see long strings of beautiful red cattle yoked and trained ready for work. These cattle find ready sale at good prices, quite equal to average prices for work horses. True, they are slow, and yet a yoke of active Devons will travel at a pace that would surprise one who had never worked with them. Let a stranger try to drive such a team and he will soon find out. On rough and stony ground their work, though slow, is surer than that of horses, and after their work is done they can be fattened into very fair beef. You will not find in ordinary farm life anything closer to the plan of "eating your cake and having it" than this practice of doing the farm work with a yoke of oxen and then selling the workers for beef.

The Minnesota Horticultural society is to the fore again with an offer of prizes for new varieties of seedling apples.

The value of yeast as a disinfectant for wounds and for use internally in veterinary practice is being investigated by Dr. Peters of the Nebraska experiment station. Promising results have already been obtained.

The Maryland experiment station finds reason to believe that ground peanut hulls are being used to some extent to adulterate feeds, probably bran, and purchasers should be on the lookout for this, as the hulls are worthless as a feed.

According to press reports, it appears that Ellwood Cooper of California offers to undertake the extermination of the gypsy and brown tail moths in Massachusetts for the sum of \$25,000, depending on parasites to do the work.

With likely mules selling at \$200 to \$400 a pair, why is it that mule breeding is confined so largely to Kentucky?
