Bourne and Mulkey! Names to conjure with.

A good townsite and an ambitious boomer make abundant excuse for a county division fight.

Mr. Schwab thinks the steel industry is only in its infancy. Wonder what Mr. Carnegie thinks of that?

After spending the maximum of time and hot air allowable for one subject—the Brownsville affair—the senate has decided to "compromise" and accept the president's stand.

Central Oregon is up-to-date on county division. First it is proposed to divide Madras off from Crook county, in the west, then Bend, in the south.

With his farm soaked with moisture and every other promise of a good crop, and a country-wide reputation as the producer of good horse flesh, the Sherman county farmer will be envied.

We have taken occasion at different times to call attention to Wasco's need for a free reading room and the approvals we have heard from many citizens encourages us to mention it again. To make our little city attractive to both our neighbors and strangers should be one of the first efforts of every patriotic citizen.

There is very little talk just now about the proposed jute mill for Oregon's penitentiary. But the matter is far from dead. The question will be brought up and the fight will be made. On one side will be the farmer and his friends, those who are for progress and equality, and the argument opposed will be the trusts, its tools, the opponents of prosperity and justice and the few who see wrong. And the victory will be with the people.

The senatorial fight is over. The direct primary law has triumphed. Jonathan Bourne, was elected Tuesday to the U. S. senate by the Oregon legislature for the long term of six years, and F. W. Mulkey for the short term, about six weeks. The proceedings in thus carrying out the people's wishes was a tame affair and devoid of special interest. No speeches, no eulogies, no requiems. Just plain, ordinary routine work. The absence of bouquets, Bandweiser and other bric-a-brac signaled the entrance of the direct primary law into the field of practical politics.

Oregon and Washington never received better treatment at the hands of any congress in the matter of appropriations for harbors and waterways than has been granted during the present session. The appropriation for the mouth of the Columbia was all that was asked and with it the jetty will be completed. The Cello canal gets \$100,000 cash and \$500,000 additional as needed. The sum of \$120,000 was also granted for the improvement of the river between Cello and the mouth of the Snake and \$42,000 for that part of the stream between Wenatchee and Bridgeport. The canal appropriation is satisfactory to every one as it now commits the government to complete the work.

It is generally believed among farmers that the soil here will be in better condition to produce a big crop when sowing time comes next spring than it has been for years. The abundant moisture which has fallen during the winter has wet the earth to a depth of nine feet, so say those who had occasion to dig to that depth before the freeze. This moisture is still sinking but will immediately return when the surface commences to dry. Then, again, the frost has reached to a depth of from twelve to eighteen inches and will give the surface just the look and feel it needs.

Added to this is the promise of an early spring. Indeed, it seems the weather man is dealing the Sherman county farmer a full hand. Of course nothing is certain, but everyone feels confident that next harvest will bring forth a bumper of a wheat crop for this section.
