LET REFERENDUM DEFEAT MEASURE

Public Will not Indorse Useless Law
and May Invoke Referendum

Who wants this new judicial dis-
trict? No one but a few politicians.
The lawyers of the section, the only
ones who can possibly be benefited by
the creation are by no means unani-
mous in its support. None have under-
taken to defend it. The measure was
passed by our legislature and will
become effective unless the people of
this section invoke the Referendum
and defeat it. Friends of the measure
doubtless thought that it would pass
unnoticed, or if the graft were dis-
covered, the people would not pre-
sume to apply the Referendum law—
which is their right and duty—but
they are mistaken. The people will
not submit to that which they can
improve. They are going to see a
reason for laws or fight them. There
is no reason to be given for this act
creating an eleventh judicial district.

Correspondence from proper
authority refers us to the Initiative and
Referendum amendment to the con-
stitution "together with provisions
found at page 244 of the Session
Laws of 1903." Someone must get at
the head of this, it will not do to let
the eleventh district stand as a re-
proach to our citizenship.
