In this issue is printed a good
article, copied from The Rural
Spirit, on the subject of handling
grain without the expense of buying
bags. Others are to follow.

Just one word regarding the 11th
judicial district(?) and referendum;
The News entered upon discussion of
this subject on its own account and
because the extra expense would be
a burden upon the taxpayers, wholly
unnecessary and barren of beneficial
results, but we did not claim these
views to be in accord with those of
the public until this was assured to
be the case, until it was clear that
the every-day citizen, the man with-
out any direct affiliation with politics
or political graft was opposed to this
act of the legislature and would
favor referendum. All of which shall
be proven in due time and in a lawful
manner.

Let us crave pardon of the Sher-
man County Observer and extend the
humble supplication also to The Dalles
Chronicle for being "a disgrace to
the 'art preservative' for some
months"—what ever that phrase
may signify—or compelling a jour-
nalist to affiliate. Now we submit to
a just and candid public and to the
friends of this sheet in both Moro
and The Dalles, that if either the
Observer or the Chronicle has ever
preserved any thing it has been
malice or clippings from newspapers,
or if there is a journalist in either
office the change has occurred since
the last issue of the mentioned pu-
lications. Not wishing to be mean
and not desiring to make enemies
even of such affairs as the Observer
or the Chronicle yet the editor of this
sheet, "as one who loves his profes-
sion and has a pride in it," must state
that if he or any one else reaches
mature years, if, indeed the hairs on
his head turn gray and yet he is
responsible for nothing superior to
either of the above mentioned news-
papers he may relieve, and justly,
all that was contained in the con-
temptable harangue against the
News and its manager which appear-
ed in the Observer and was copied
by The Dalles Daily Chronicle.

PALUCE WILL USE ELEVATORS.

This journal has had considerable
to say the past year about the heavy
burden imposed upon the farmers by
the sack graft and has recommended
the bulk system—the use of steel or
galvanized iron bins on the farm, the
tight wagon box and the elevator at
the shipping point as the logical so-
lution of this question, predicting
that the outrageous high price being
charged for sacks will only tend to
hasten the adoption of the remedy,
says the RURAL SPIRIT. It is coming
quicker than we anticipated as the
following from Waverly, Wash.,
shows:

"The farmers and wheat growers
of this district have decided to do
away with the 'sack profit,' and ele-
vators for handling wheat in bulk will
be built all along the Spokane &
Inland Electric road. A very enthu-
siastic meeting was held here recently
and the matter thoroughly discussed
by the farmers. The meeting was
addressed by a representative of the
elevator company, who explained the
advantages to be derived from the
farmers handling loose instead of
sacked grain. The company will be
organized to enable the wheatgrower
to handle his grain in the most eco-
nomical manner, and thereby save
the price of sacks which sell from 10
to 11 cent each. The farmers feel
that they have been imposed upon
by the 'sack grafter' long enough,
and they have decided to stop buying
sacks and handle their wheat in bulk.
Wagon boxes that will hold 100 bush-
els of wheat to haul to the elevators
will cost the farmers but \$15 each,
and these boxes can be used from

year to year. All elevators will be
equipped with the most modern
machinery for the handling and clean-
ing grain in the most economical
manner. Wheat can be handled
fully a cent a bushel cheaper than
through warehouses in sacks, Wagon
dumps and shipping scales will be
provided at every elevator. These
elevators will probably be built all
through the Paluce country this
season, as farmers all over Eastern
Washington are anxious to do away
with sacks."

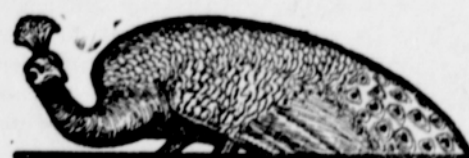
