Judge Scoffs at States Rights.

Justice J. Franklin Fort of the New
Jersey supreme court maintains that
courts of the United States have the
right to settle one and for all the Japa-
nese question in California. In dis-
cussing the power of the judiciary under
the constitution of the United States,
he said: "I thoroughly believe that the
courts of the United States have the
power to reach in any community any
violation of the federal constitution or
the enactments of congress or of the
treaties between this and other nations.
I am not prepared to discuss now
the question as to whether the United
States courts can go into the schools of
a state and regulate matters therein.
Mr. Root, I understand, believes they
can, but I do not know that this ques-
tion, which is vexing California, will be
decided by the United States courts."
